Tomerrow afternoon and evening Harvard, Yale, Technology, Brown, Tufts, Bates and Springfield Y. M. C. A. will compete in the second annual tournament of the New England Intercollegiate Wrestling Association at the Hemenway gymnasium in Cambridge. Last year the association was formed after a conference of managers of wrestling teams from the leading New England colleges. The initial tournament proved a great success and will be a permanent institution. Yale won first honors last Winter and from all indications looks capable of repeating in tomorrow's matches, although Harvard has a far more formidable aggregation at present than it had a year ago.

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It will be a battle royal between the Yale and Harvard mat artists, for Yale, with Malcolm Baldrige, the football tackle, starring, and Capt W. B. Snew of Harvard, also a lineman on the Harvard football eleven, practically on a par with the big Eli wrestler, will strive to bring home first honors.

average, having hung up victories over Andover by a score of 24-6, Brown by 21-3, Columbia by 24-0, and Technology by 13-10. It is notable that in these matches none of the points scored by Harvard's opponents came by virtue of straight falls. Yale has chalked up wins over Pennsylvania and Columbia.

The 115-pound class appears to be anyone's victory, for in the list of entries there appears no one man who stands out above the other contestant. In the 125-pound class E. F. Davidson, '17, of Harvard, who placed second in this event last year, appears to be the logical choice for first place.

First honors in the 158-pound class are conceded to Potter of Yale, who easily won the event last Winter. Potter is known as the intercollegiate Stecher, for he relies wholly on a leg scissors hold to floor his opponent. His powerful legs have yet to fail to bring home the desired results.
