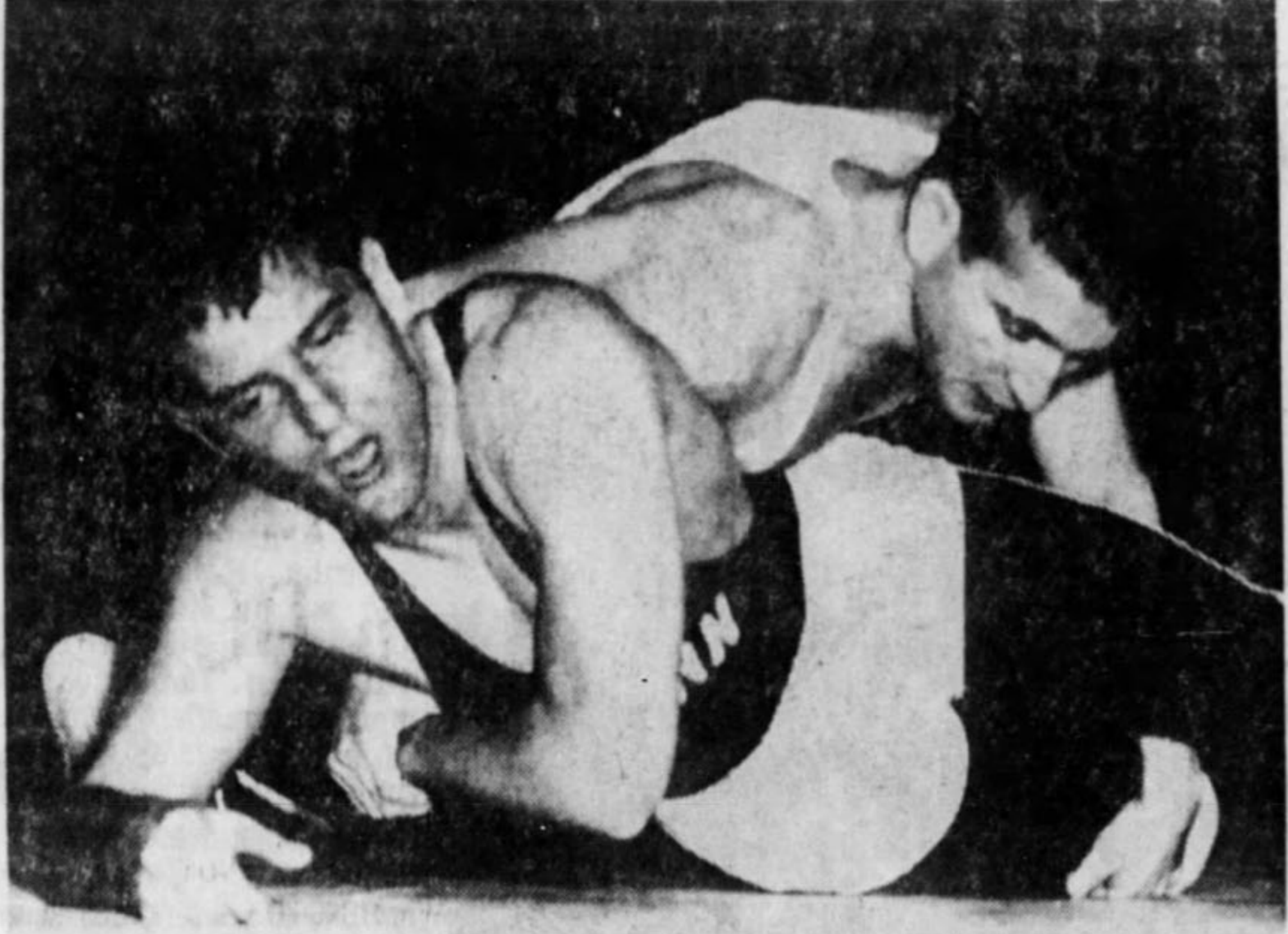


Pittsburgh, Army setting team pace in EIWA

Franzen, Nance win two matches

Pittsburgh and Army tied for the lead in the 60th annual Eastern Intercollegiate Wrestling Assn. Championships after quarter-final round bouts at Franklin and Marshall College's Mayser Gymnasium Friday night. Each has 16 points.

F&M's Shimansky, Schneiderman bow in quarter-finals

The Diplomat grappler wasn't as fortunate in the quarter-finals and he lost to John Windfelder of Penn State in overtime, 5-3. Windfelder is second-seeded at 123 pounds.

Lehigh and Navy, with 15 points apiece, are tied for third place, while defending champion Syracuse and Cornell are in a deadlock for fifth place with 14 points each.

Pitt had six of its wrestlers advance to today's semi-finals which begin at 12:30 this afternoon. Lehigh, Syracuse, Army and Navy each have five entries in the semi-finals.

The two defending champions, Gerry Franzen of Navy (177) and Jim Nance of Syracuse (unlimited) both survived quarter-final round bouts.

Host Franklin and Marshall College had both of its wrestlers who won preliminary bouts lose in the quarter-finals.

One of the losses, by the Diplomats' outstanding wrestler of this past season Saul Shimansky, came in one of the outstanding bouts of the quarter-final program.

Diplomats capture two early bouts

Saul Shimansky and Bill Schneiderman carried the Franklin and Marshall College colors through the preliminary round of the 60th annual Eastern Intercollegiate Wrestling Assn. Championships before 2,000 fans at Mayser Gymnasium Friday afternoon.

However, it was Army and Pittsburgh to the head of the class with 10 advancement points each, while Cornell, Lehigh, and Navy were close behind with nine points each. Rutgers and defending champion Syracuse were next in line with eight advancements.

Army set the pace with eight wrestlers advancing from the preliminary, with heavyweight Ed Cate being the only casualty as he dropped a 3-1 verdict to Clarence Buchwald, Cornell, in the fading seconds. Pitt advanced six wrestlers through the preliminaries, while Cornell Lehigh, Navy and Penn State each had seven. Rutgers and Syracuse also advanced six.

Shimansky, F&M's golden hope, pinned John Brennan, Brown, in 5:08. On the way to the victory the home standing star constructed a 6-2 lead on a take down, reversal and escape. Brennan scored his only points on a reversal.

Terry Haise, Syracuse, and John Windfelder, Penn State, first and second seeded, also turned in decisions at 123, although Fred Crawford, Navy, fought Haise all the way before bowing 5-3.

Neal Orr, Cornell, pinned F&M's Mike Wood at 130 pounds, in 6:35, while Pittsburgh's top seeded Mike Johnson pinned Sam Pierson, of Princeton, in two minutes and 13 seconds.

Mark Scureman, Army, pinned F&M's Neil Thompson in 6:56 of the 137-pound bout, after piling up a 13-0 lead. Wayne Hicks, Navy, top seeded in this division, pinned Bruce Buck Princeton, in 4:20.

Dale Kistler, F&M, dropped a 5-2 decision to Princeton's Jim Leach in the 147 pound class, after falling behind 4-2 at an early point in the bout. Doug Koch, Lehigh captain, easily decision Al Lilly, Temple, 7-3, in the same weight class.

Dave Donovan, battled John Welch on even terms for most of the 157-pound clash, but lost a 4-2 decision as the Rutgers grappler registered a takedown at the buzzer. Dick Slutzky, Syracuse star, pinned Pennsylvania's Chris Olmstead, in 1:11 of the 157-pound division.

Marty Strayer of Penn State, former Manheim Central star, won his bout at 167 pounds over Bill Lachenmayr of Lehigh in the final 11 seconds. Strayer, who is top-seeded at this weight, was having unexpected trouble from the Lehigh grappler and appeared headed for a 2-2 tie.

However, with just 11 seconds remaining in the bout, Strayer picked up two points on a predicament to win the bout. F & M's representative at 167, John Taylor, dropped a 5-2 decision to Pete Morgan of Navy. Morgan opened the scoring in the first period with a takedown in the first minute. He rode Taylor the rest of the period.

At 177 pounds, the Dips' Steve Dubner was defeated by Fran Ferraro of Cornell, 6-3. Ferraro scored first with a takedown in the first period but Dubner cut his lead in half with an escape. Another takedown made it 3-1 in favor of Ferraro.

Tom McBee of F&M was hampered by an arm injury in his bout with Ellery Seitz of Penn State and the Lion wrestler came through with a pin in 4:43. They were wrestling at 191 pounds. The bout had to be stopped for McBee's arm to be worked on after only five seconds had elapsed. Another delay was necessary a short time later.

Bill Schneiderman of F & M sent the Diplomat fans home happy as he won his unlimited bout over Bob Kocher of Navy on a pin. The Diplomat heavyweight needed only 2:57 to accomplish this as he joined Shimansky as the only Diplomats in the quarter-final round.

Kocher stayed away from Schneiderman in the early going but then the Diplomat got a takedown and he immediately put Kocher in trouble with an arm hold. A body press followed and the match was over.

to have 130-pounder, Yale was out of the 137-pound class and Princeton was absent from the unlimited class.

A team is penalized five points for not having an entry.

THE WRESTLERS, AS FAR as the scoreboard was concerned, were identified by green and red anklets.

F&M's first attempt at holding the EIWA Championships appears destined to be successful, if the opening day festivities can be used as a yardstick.

PETE FREY, OF YALE, wrestled for Franklin and Marshall College as a sophomore. Frey forced Army's Tom Thompson into overtime with a late flurry, but dropped a 5-1 decision at 157. The Yale entry rallied in the last eight seconds to gain a regulation 5-5 deadlock.

LEHIGH AND PENN STATE have strong crowd support in the championships. There are also a surprising number of Army rooters in the stands.

ELLIOT GRAY SIMONS, FOUR-time State College Conference champion from Lock Haven State, was on hand as the assistant coach for the Army squad.

Simons, looking as trim as he did while competing for the United States Olympic team in 1960, is partly responsible for the fine showing of the Cadets' lightweight grapplers.

MILLERSVILLE STATE wrestling mentor Jim Maury was clock operator for the number three mat.

SAUL SHIMANSKY's quarter-final loss to Penn State's John Windfelder caused the most comments of any bout on the agenda.

Shimansky, Franklin and Marshall College's outstanding grappler, held a 4-2 lead over the second seeded Windfelder, with time rapidly running out.

All the time had ticked off the floor clock, which wasn't official, and Windfelder was awarded a reversal to tie the score at 4-4. The Penn State star went on to register a 5-3 overtime victory.

Coach Roy Phillips naturally felt that his boy had won in overtime and naturally was let down. "I think Saul is as good as any man in the class," Phillips said. "He wrestled well and in my mind was the winner."

Shimansky, of Amityville, N.Y., was naturally upset at the loss, but took it as gracefully as the sophomore stand-out takes victory.

"I felt badly at first," Shimansky said in the locker room, "but there's nothing I can do about it now. The F&M grappler added, 'I felt we both wrestled sloppy, he got some breaks and I got some breaks, but neither of us set the world on fire.'"

There were 2,000 fans at the afternoon session, while approximately 3,000 were on hand Friday night.

There were 108 bouts, of the 180 to be held in the tournament, scheduled for Friday. There were three byes, leaving 105 events held. Brown failed
