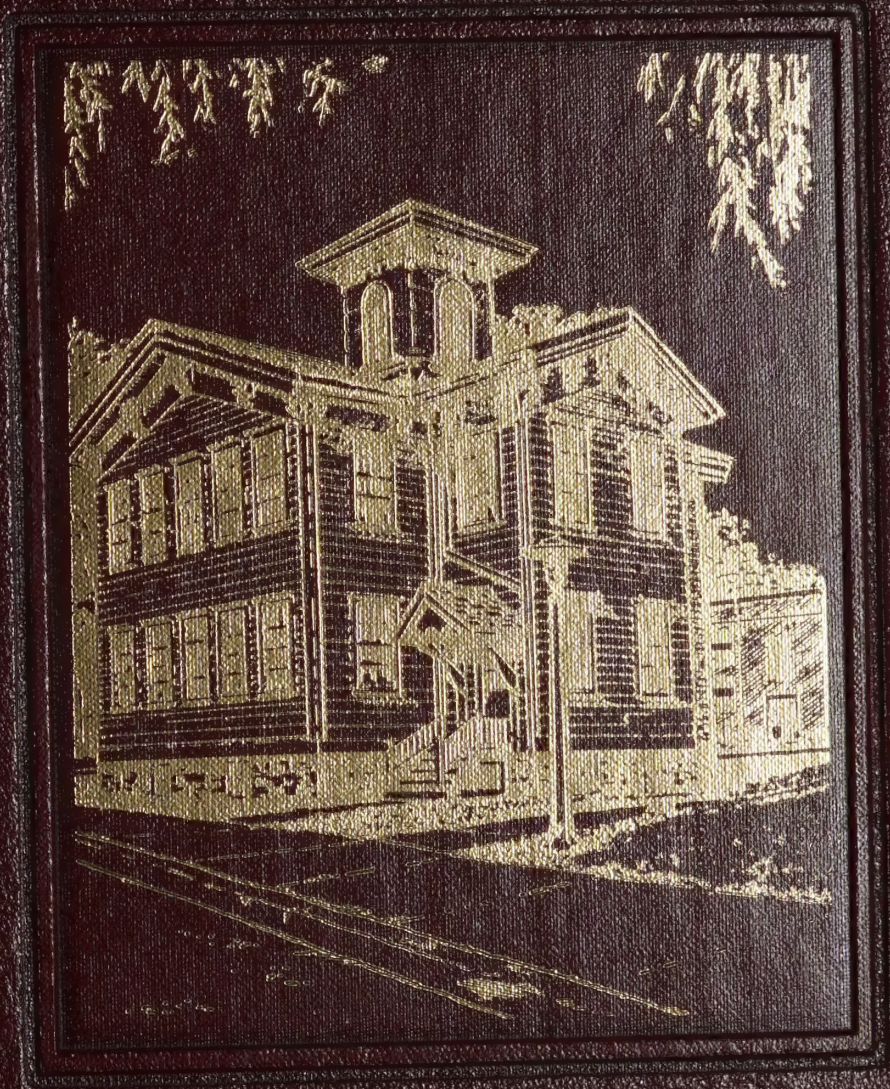

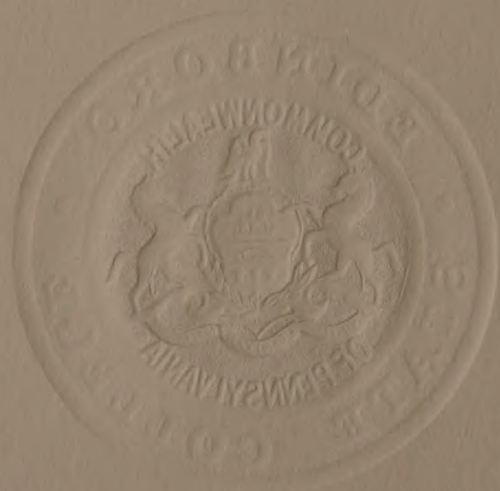

But then the interesting part begins. Following the initial visit to a registration building, students begin a journey filled with computer cards or a lack thereof.

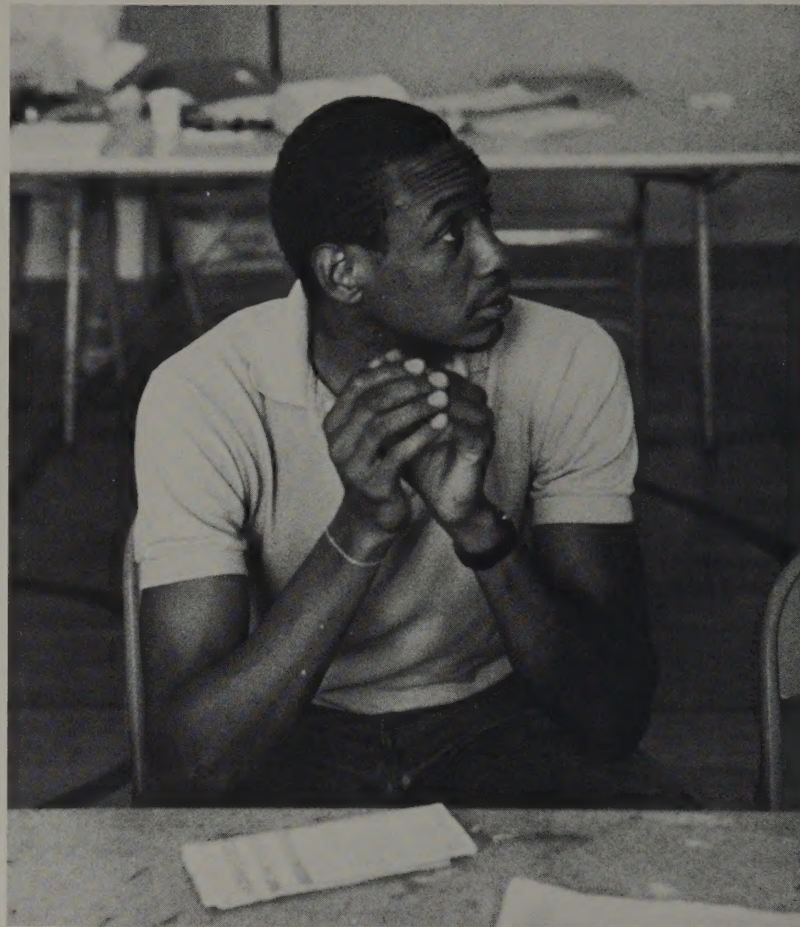

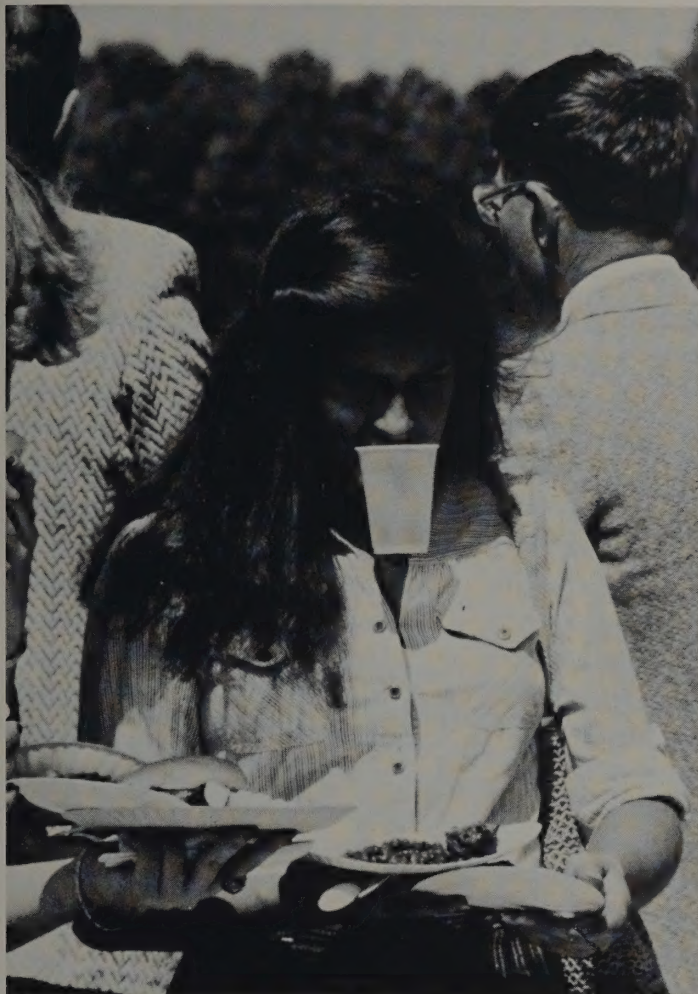
the dread allergy that appears in September, November, January, and April.

This book will be fewer than 60 days old when Edinboro State College will cease to exist.

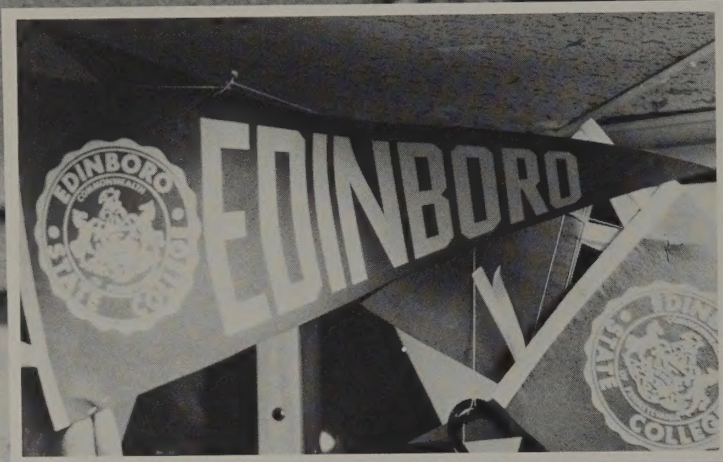
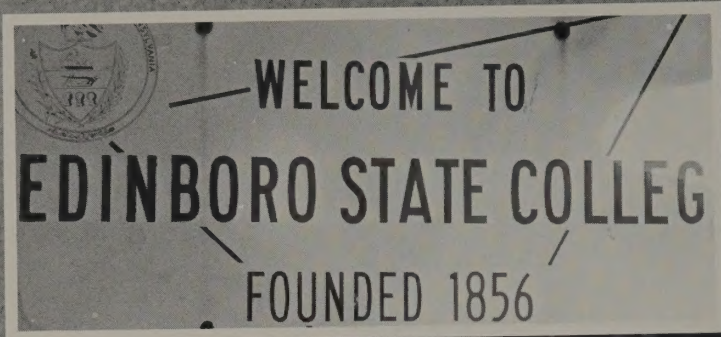
Welcome to the last Edinboro State College Yearbook. You are the proud owner of a collector's item.

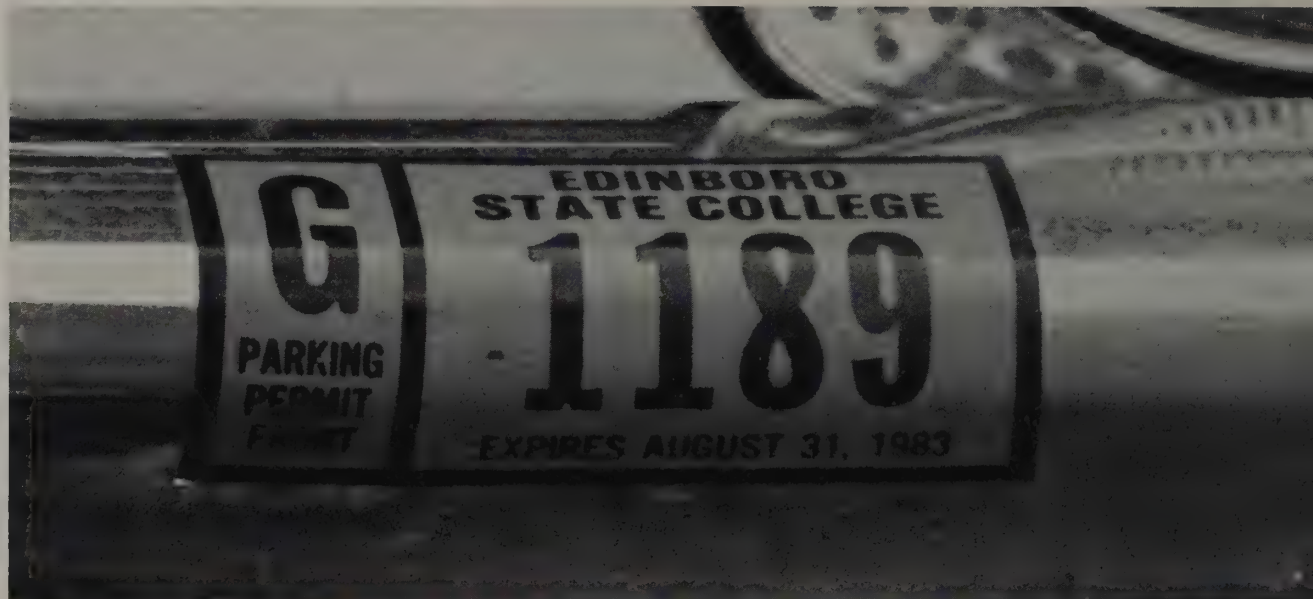
"You know my roommates Mom, Dad. They like practical jokes. How could I get four C's and an A? You know I'm a better student than that."

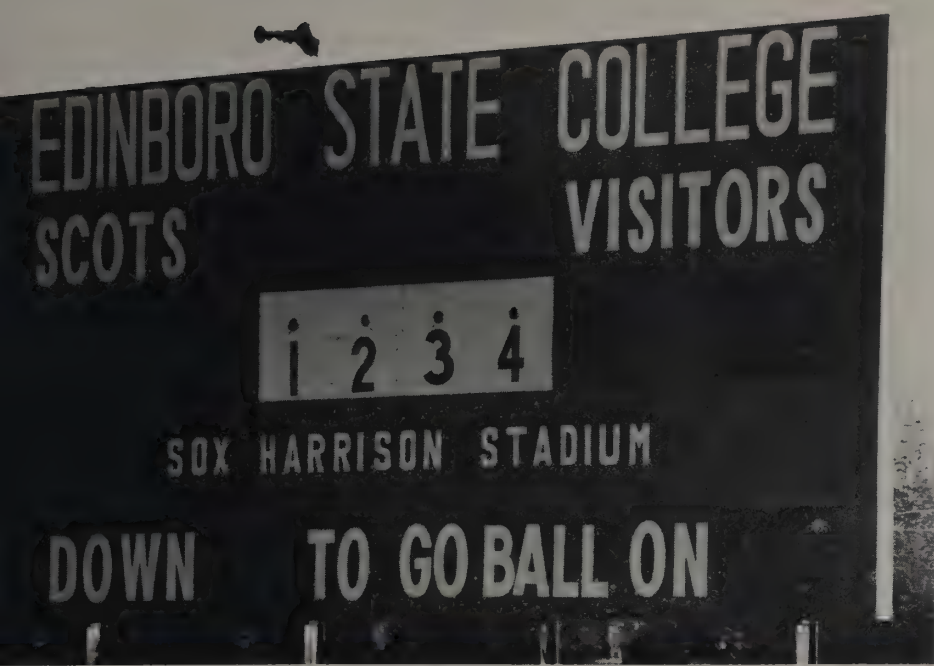
"Look, it's the "old" grade form. Let's wait. The new one should be here in a day or so. Then we'll see."

When a new history of Edinboro State College is written, it will be titled, "A Portrait of Edinboro: From Private Academy to a State University, 1856-1982."

The chronological listing of the development of the institution over the last 125 years includes sterile facts; however, the growth of our school was brought about by and has effected the lives of hundreds of thousands of individuals.

Our school always has been and will continue to be people working together to improve individual lives and our society through education.

The residents of Edinboro, primarily of Scots and Scots-Irish descent, organized the original Edinboro Academy for the purpose of providing an education for the youth of the area. On October 23, 1856, the privately owned institution was incorporated under that name.

Classes opened in the Academy Hall (then located on the circle walk in front of the present auditorium) on December 15, 1857 for students in the first to 10th or 11th grade.

Although courses at the Academy primarily were designed for elementary and secondary pupils, a program was established to prepare students to enter the teaching profession.

As this program was being developed at Edinboro, the Pennsylvania Legislature passed the Normal School Act on May 20, 1857 to designate institutions throughout the state to educate, train, and certify teachers.

Edinboro applied under this Act and on January 26, 1861 was certified as a Normal School under the name, Northwestern Normal School.

During the next 53 years, the school grew and new programs developed.

Between 1861 and the 1880's, Edinboro granted the degrees Bachelor of Elementary, Scientific, or Classical Didactics. Following a period of successful teaching, graduates were awarded the degree Master of Didactics.

When the practice of granting degrees was discontinued, a graduating student received a diploma and a certification of teaching.

The Northwestern Normal School remained a private institution, with State affiliation, until 1911 when the Commonwealth decided to purchase the then 13 Normal Schools.

On April 17, 1914, ceremonies were held on our campus to recognize the purchase and officially name the institution, Edinboro State Normal School.

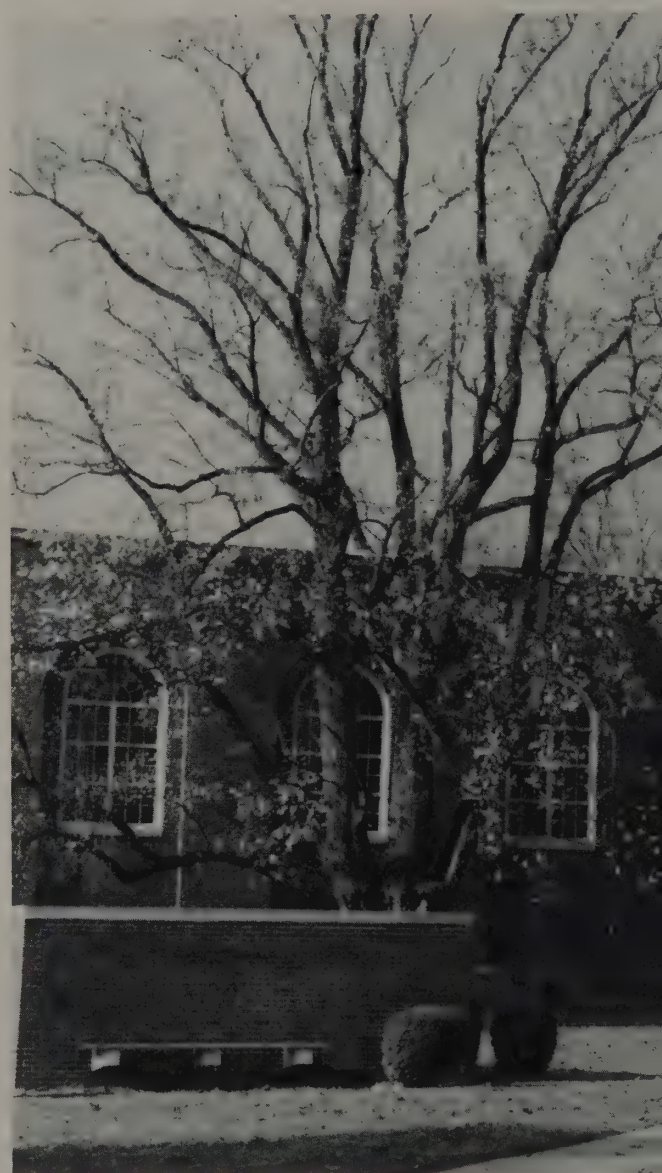
A typical Normal School education required two years of study. Edinboro expanded its program to include a three year, a four year, and even a fifth year of teacher education.

These programs were recognized by the Com-



monwealth on June 4, 1926 when Edinboro State Normal School was authorized to grant the degree Bachelor of Science in Education for elementary and junior high teaching. On January 14, 1927, the school was recognized formally as a degree-granting institution, and on May 31, 1927 our school was re-named, Edinboro State Teachers College.

Although the college was authorized to grant only the degree Bachelor of Science in Education, Edinboro once again moved ahead providing programs and course work to prepare its



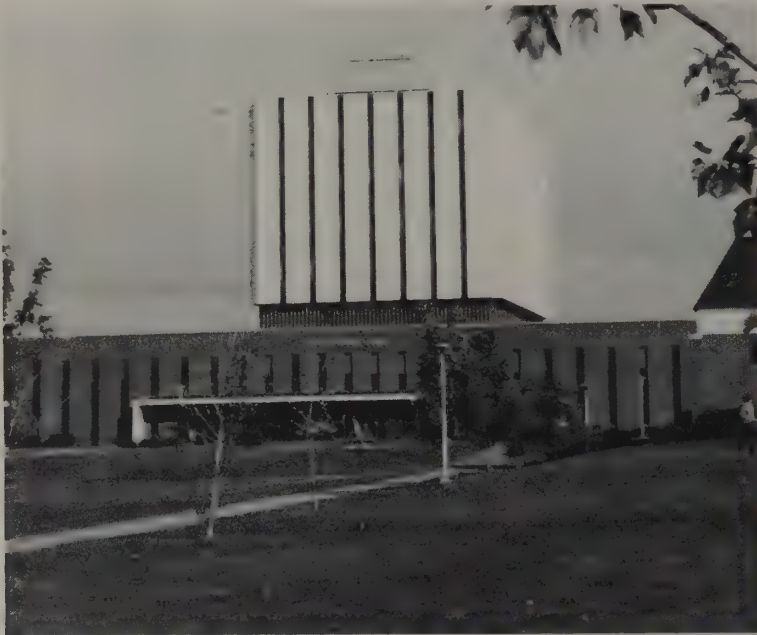


students for a variety of careers.

This foresight in planning proved to be beneficial when in 1941 Edinboro was requested by the State to offer courses in fields other than teacher education.

In 1957 and 1959 the college was authorized to grant the degree Master of Science in Education in elementary and secondary areas respectively.

During the 1950's, enrollments in colleges in-





creased rapidly and students were demanding a variety of programs. Edinboro was prepared.

By the end of that decade, the college offered sufficient programs to be considered a multi-purpose institution of higher education. Officially, this was recognized on January 8, 1960, when we became Edinboro State College.

Once again Edinboro did not rest on its laurels. It continued to develop new programs.

Before the end of the 1960's, course work was available within a wide variety of disciplines



leading to the degrees Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts. In 1969, a graduate faculty was designated.

A university is an institution of higher education which is organized administratively and academically into colleges or schools representing several disciplines.

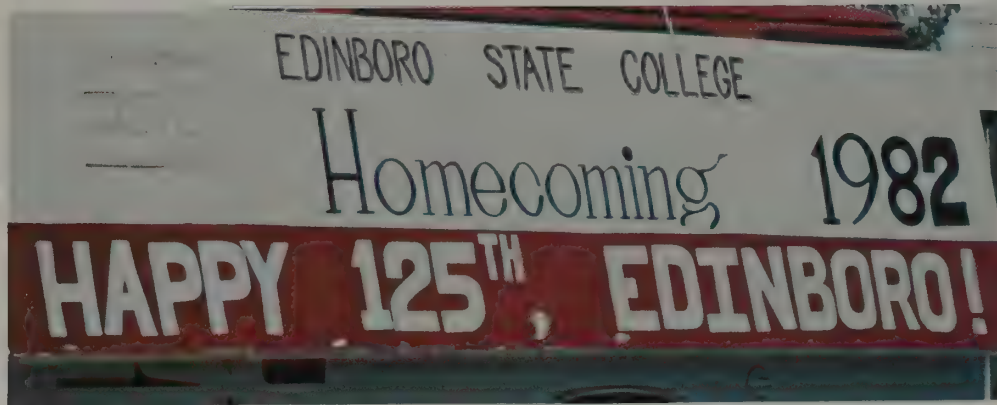
During the 1960's and 70's, Edinboro State College re-organized to comply with this structure. We have established schools and numerous programs to qualify our institution, along with our sister state colleges, as part of a university system.

As in the past, Edinboro is ready for the challenge.

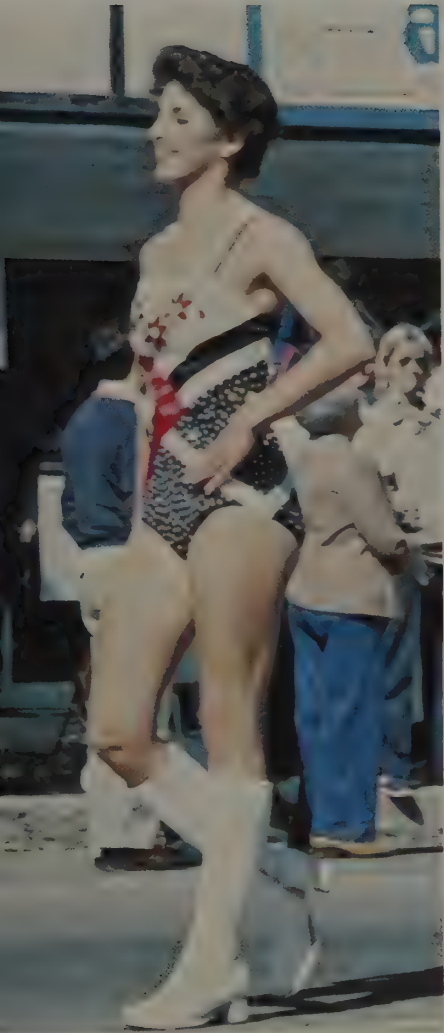
On October 1, 1982, the Legislature of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania presented the Governor with the completed bill to establish the State System of Higher Education.

Effective July 1, 1983, our school will become Edinboro University of the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education.

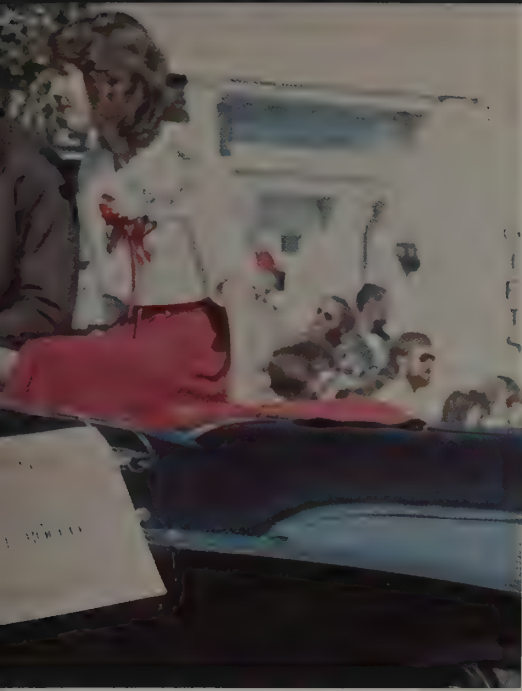
Suzanne lists Pittsburgh, PA. as home. She is a senior, majoring in Nursing.

HOMECOMING 1982

The Edinboro State-Slippery Rock homecoming football contest lacked the punch of the Thursday fireworks that kicked-off the 125th Anniversary homecoming celebration.

But the game did provide the Scots with a 10-7 win that preserved their perfect season and inched them closer to a Western Division Pennsylvania Conference Championship.

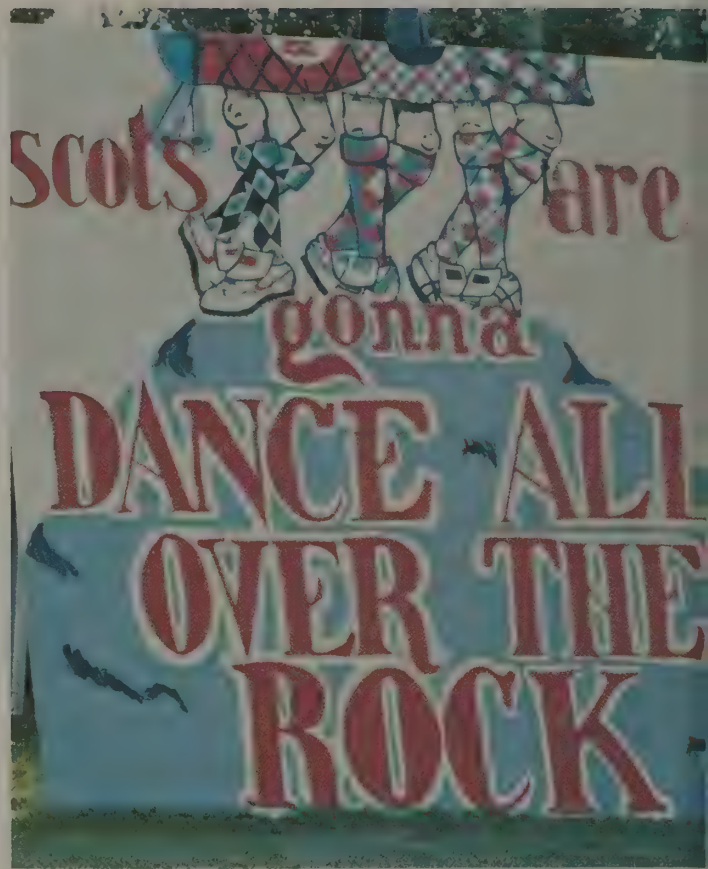
The Fighting Scots mounted a scoring drive early in the game. Beginning on their own 20-yard-line the Scots moved the ball easily until they reached the Rockets 27.

Scot kicker Rich Ruskiewicz attempted a 44-yard field goal, but a Rocket defender blocked the attempt.

The Scots finally lit the scoreboard late in the second period when Eric Bosley sprinted into the Rocket end zone on a 31-yard reverse. Ruskiewicz's point after gave the Scots their only touchdown of the day and a 7-0 lead at the half.

Early in the third period the Rockets took advantage of a misdirected Edinboro pass, intercepting the ball and returned it to the Scots 11-yard line.

Six plays later the Rock's Shayne Stone bested the ESC defense when he plunged one-yard for Slippery Rock's only touchdown of the afternoon. The point after tied the score at 7-7.



The only other score in the game came late in the third period on a 28-yard Ruskiewicz field goal that provided the Scots with the 10-7 game winning edge.

In a defense-dominated game ESC held the Rockets to a game total 135 yard. The Scots managed little more net yardage with their game total 212 yards.

The standouts in this year's homecoming fray were most certainly Rick Jordan and John O'Rourke, a pair of Scot linemen who recorded a total of 23 Scot tackles.

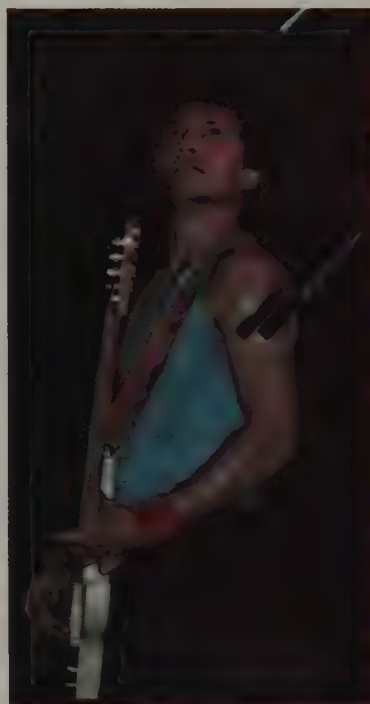






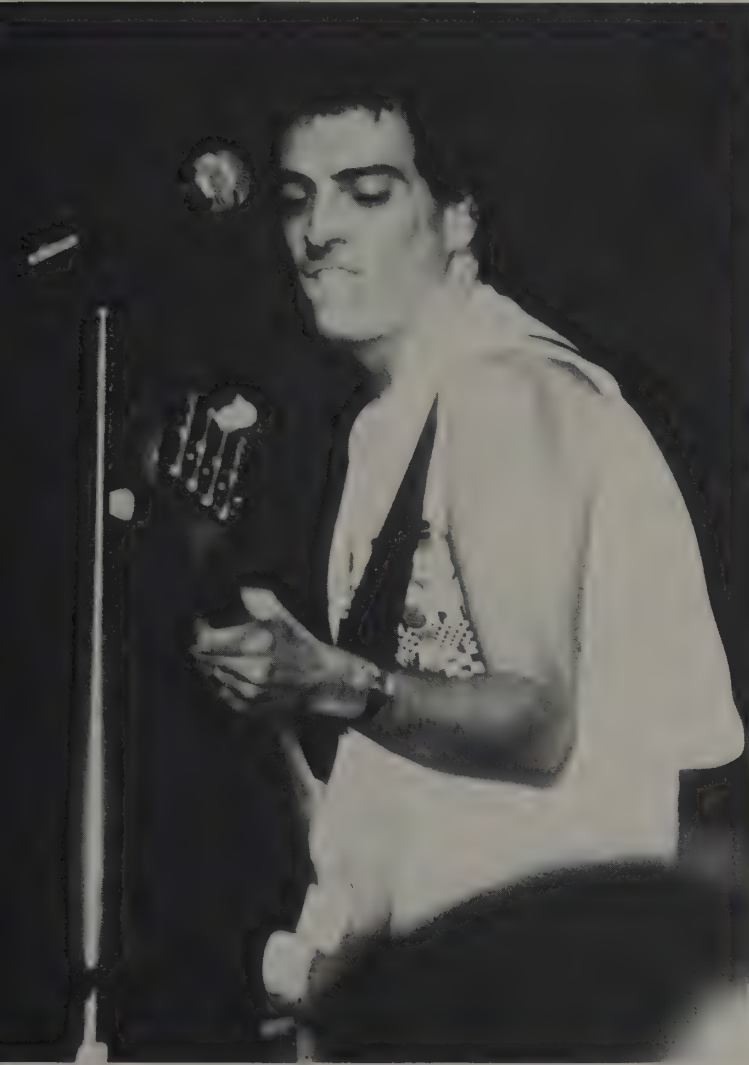

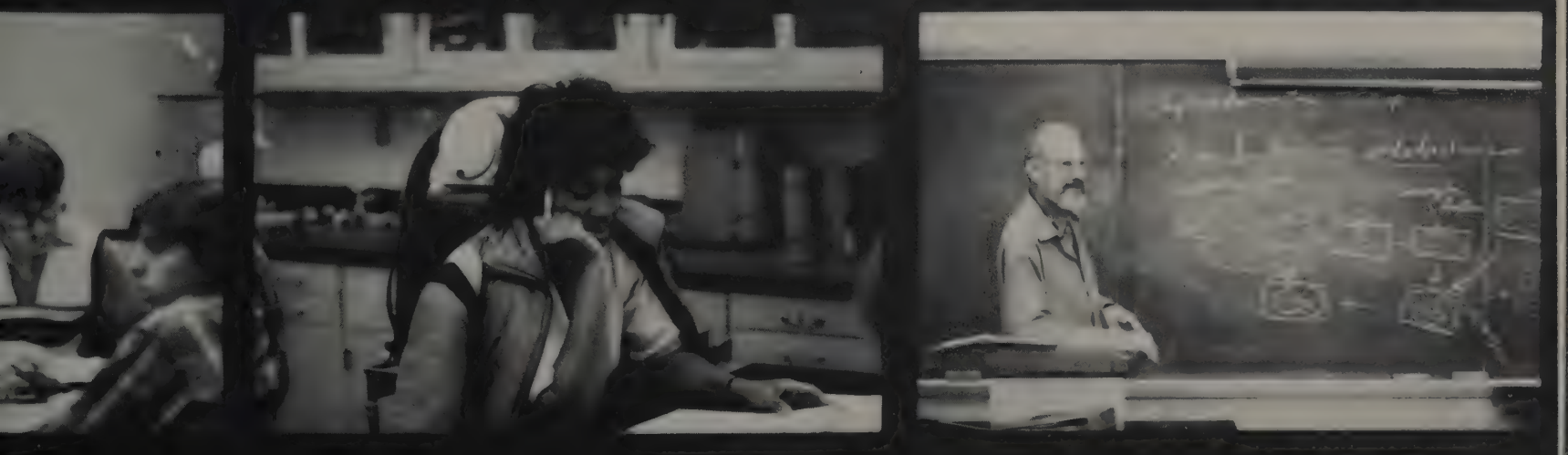

The film, "An American Werewolf in London" was shown at midnight capped off the evening.



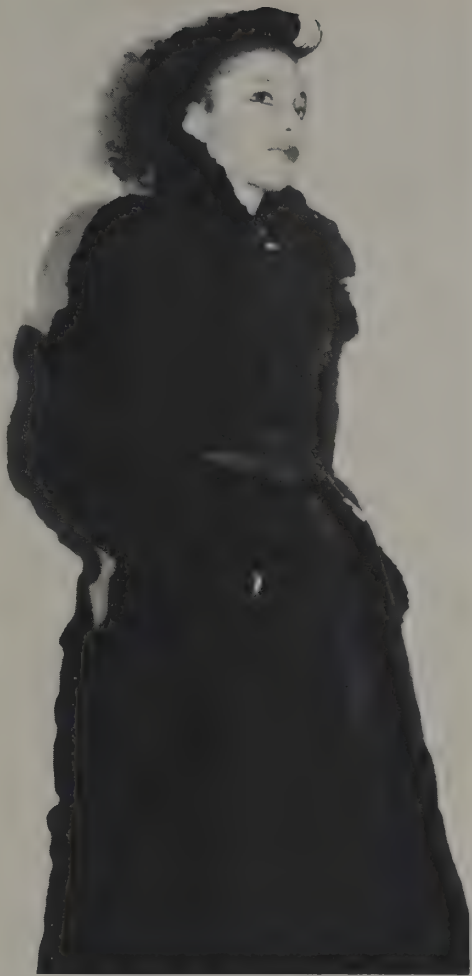






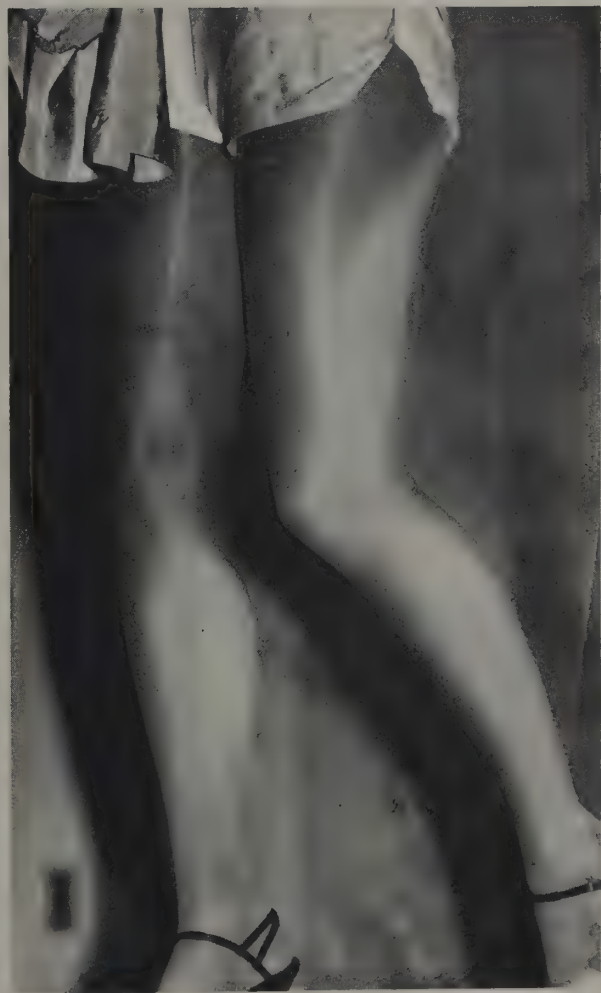

ESC AWARDS PRIZES IN ESSAY CONTEST

The Edinboro State College English and Theatre Arts Department sponsored the annual Freshman Essay Contest, funded by Student Services, Inc. and the President's Discretionary Fund. Each participant submitted a 500-700 word essay based upon personal experience, and three winners were selected.

Nancy Lee August of Conneaut Lake, Pa. was awarded first prize of \$100. Her essay vividly portrayed the physical and psychological damage of a very terrifying childhood experience.

Nancy and her husband, Walter, have four children, Lee, Beth, Val, and Jeff, who is

currently a sophomore at Edinboro. A part-time licensed practical nurse at Spencer Hospital in Meadville, Nancy is working toward her B.S. degree in Nursing at Edinboro State College. She has maintained a 4.0 quality point average and has been named to the Dean's List. Nancy entered the contest because she likes a challenge and because her professor, Dr. William Schopf, encouraged her to do so.

Second prize winner of \$75.00 was Mary Ploszkiewicz. Her personal experience involved a visitor from Poland who made her more aware of the meaning of Thanksgiving.

She entered the contest at the encouragement of her professor, Mr. Fred Bohne, and also because she felt that students should become involved in extra-curricular activities.

Men's Basketball

Coach Conti's team was one of the preseason favorites in the PA Conference's Western Division. And they went into Christmas break with a 5-2 record, losing only to Gannon and Akron. Over break, they won the Allegheny tournament, defeating Davis & Elkins College 56-49 in the first round, and slipping by Allegheny 57-56 for the title.

They opened their quest for a Western division championship by defeating Indiana 55-46. They also defeated Lock Haven and California before falling to Slippery Rock and Clarion, to leave the division wide open.

The offense exploded against Pitt-Johnstown, 106-99, as Land Battle, Steve Senko, Brian Simmons, and Edwin Wright all scored more than 20 points. Victories over Indiana and Lock Haven gave the hoopsters a 5-2 conference mark, tied for the top spot with Slippery Rock.

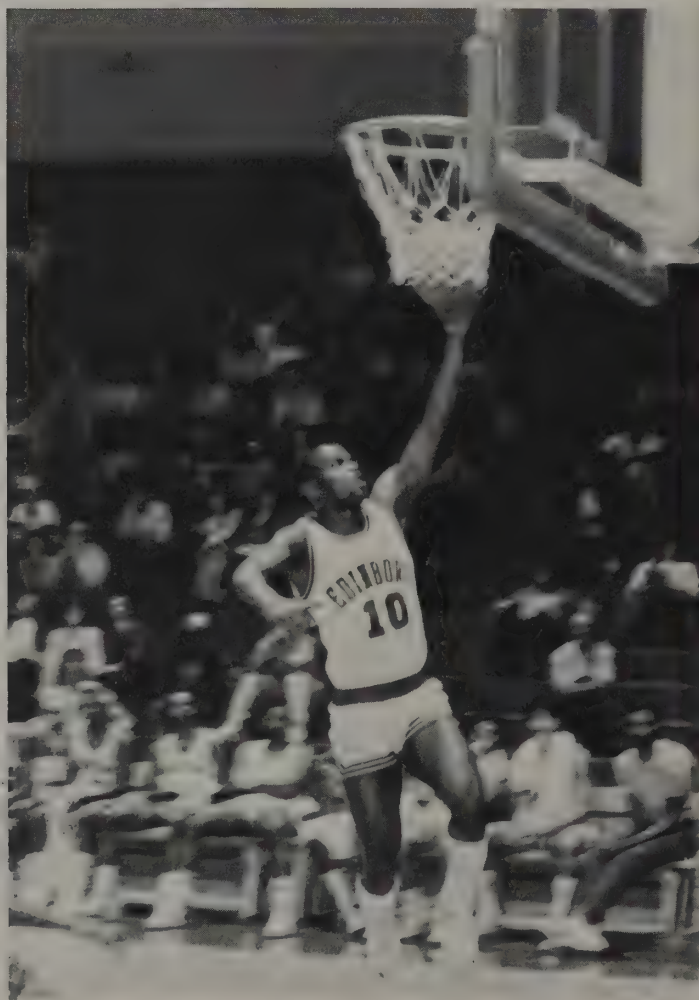

Men's Tennis

The 1982 Scot netters compiled a 12 win and 5 loss record during their Spring '82 season on their way to a 5th place ranking in the State College Conference and 15th place ranking in the Mid-State Tennis Ranking which include Division I teams. Graduation claimed 5 out of 6 starters after the Spring season, but the team bounced back to record with 4 wins and 2 losses during the fall season. They were placed 6th of 24 teams in the ECAC Tournament. Tony Womeodu ranked 2nd in the East at the close of the Fall season.

Netter's coach, Jim Flynn, said he tried to give as many players as possible a chance to show their abilities and play during the Fall season. Flynn confirmed, "We had a successful fall season with a very young team." Flynn thinks the team will contend for the State College title soon.

Women's Tennis

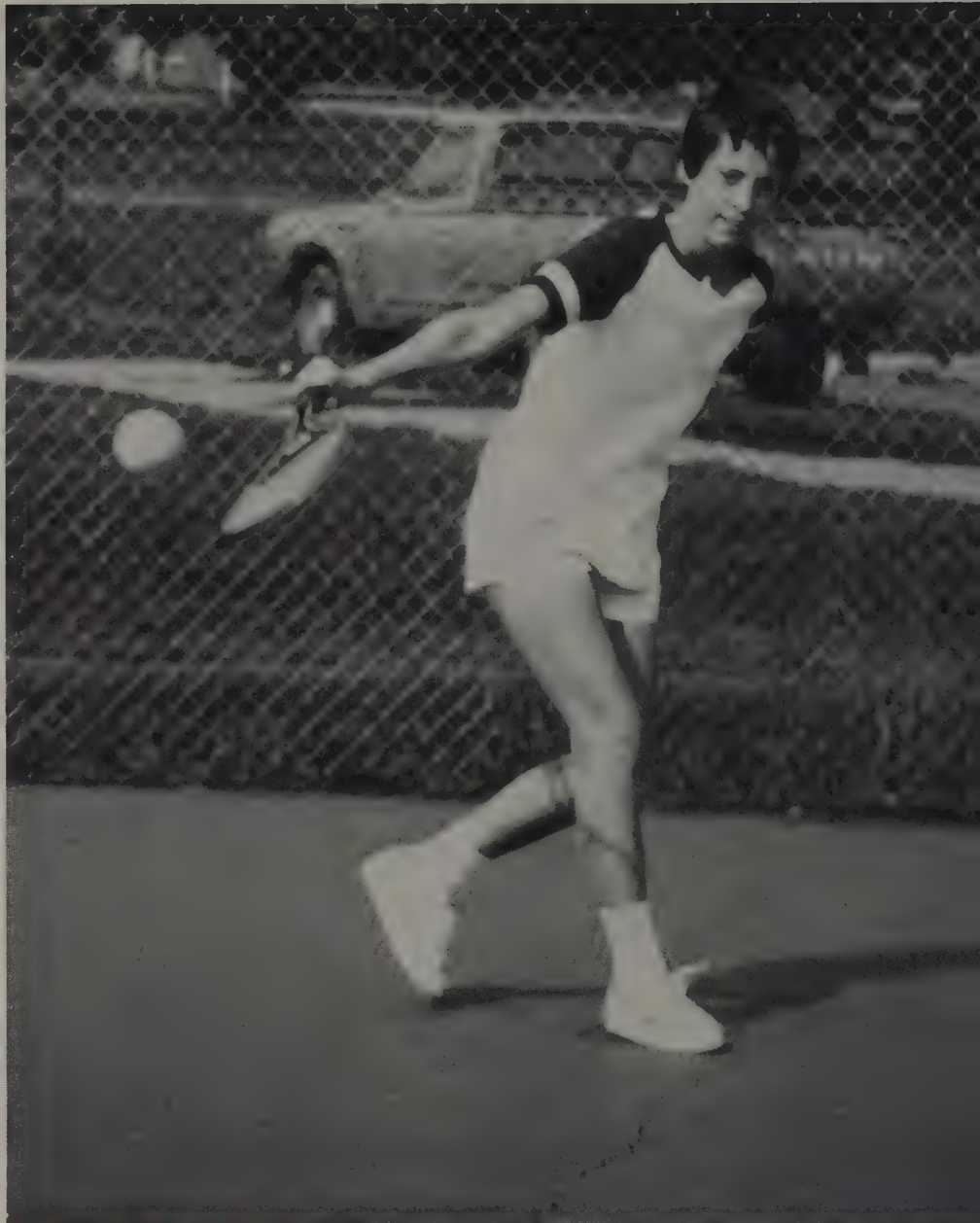
The 1982 Women's Tennis team compiled a 5-4 record during their Spring Season.

Basketball Playoffs 1981-82

With the regular season over, the Fighting Scots took a 20-6 season record and 17th place national ranking into the PSAC playoff action.

The Scots began the playoffs hosting fourth place Clarion in the Pennsylvania Conference West with the winner traveling to Bloomsburg for the Pennsylvania Conference Championship Tournament.

The Scots started slowly as Clarion took an 8-2 lead. However, the Scots led 29-25 at the half. The game continued to be a toss-up affair throughout the second half with both teams gaining small advantages throughout the final 20 minutes.

The Scots managed a slim 58-53 win to close out the first of the playoff games.

The Scots faced host Bloomsburg in the semi-finals of the PSAC Championships. In a virtual reversal of the Clarion game, ESC started with a 5-0 lead at Bloomsburg, but by the half time, they trailed 42-34. The Scots "gave it their all" in the second half, but with seven minutes left in the game, the 13-point gap was too much for the Scots to handle. Bloomsburg coasted the rest of the way to victory and a final score of 83-67.

Following the PSAC playoffs, Edinboro entered the NCAA Eastern Regionals.

Edinboro, the third-seed in the Regionals, had to face Bloomsburg, the second-seed.

The Scots took an early 13-6 lead in their second meeting with Bloomsburg.

At the end of the half, the Scots held a sum 24-23 lead. The game's second half was as close and hardfought as the first half. Unfortunately, the fight was not for the Scots to win. Bloomsburg defeated Edinboro 53-50.

Edinboro finished 3rd in the East Regionals beating Monmouth 56-53 in the consolation game. Cheyney State crushed Bloomsburg 70-48 in the finals to claim the championship.

Baseball



Coach Ron Bunofsky's baseball squad started the 1982 season on an almost perfect note.

In their first four outings the team had generated a 3-1 season mark, sweeping a double header from Clarion and dividing a pair of games with Gannon University.

But a lack of run production kept the men out of the win column in their next 12 games. The Scots dropped five of their 12 straight losses in the middle of the season by one or two runs.

But all was not bleak on this year's baseball season. While run production dropped, the Scots raised the team 60-percent over last season to a team average of .413. The team fielding average also took a giant turn upward. The team turned in 40-percent fewer errors in '82 than they registered in 1981.

Edinboro also placed two of its 1982 squad on the All Conference All-State Team. Shortstop, Greg Astorino, and catcher, Bill Moore, landed first team honors. Edinboro native, first baseman Scott Humes and pitcher Gary Lamey achieved roles on the second team.

Astorino earned his first team role by hitting safely in 23 of 62 trips to the plate. The Walston native proved the easiest sort of winner in runs scored with his total of 17. His on base average of .445 over 17 games proved a most impressive total.

Coach Ron Bunofsky says of the 1982 season, "the Win-Loss record does not reflect the true quality of the team. We were aggressive, both offensively and defensively." The team had a much improved year in 1982. "They just didn't score the clutch runs when we needed them."

They earned a 9-2 record on their way to the PSAC Western Division Championship. Their only Conference loss came at the hands of Clarion by a score of 22-20.

The Scots took on East Stroudsburg for the Pennsylvania Conference Championship. The Warriors came from behind to beat the Boro 24-22 in a thriller.

Edinboro opened the season with a 34-7 victory at Sox-Harrison Stadium. The Scots posted consecutive wins over New Haven (29-0), Shippensburg, California, Slippery Rock, Indiana, and Mansfield before bowing to Clarion.

Edinboro then defeated Lock Haven to clinch the PC-West title, and ended the regular season by whipping Mercyhurst in their first meeting ever.

Sophomore quarterback, Blair Hrovat paced the Scots offense with 1,702 yards passing on 92 completions, 14 touchdowns, and 1,931 yards in total offense, all Edinboro Records. Hrovat completed his best game against California when he posted 17 completions for 300 yards and 4 touchdowns, also Edinboro records.

Mitchell Kelly led all rushers with 355 yards, while Keith Collier, who missed 6 games with a broken foot, ran for 343 yards and 4 touchdowns. Freshman Damon Chambers also recorded four touchdowns and gained 214 yards. Eric Bosley led the receivers with 20 receptions, 445 yards, and 6 scores.

Dave Parker paced the Edinboro defensive backfield with 8 interceptions. Jim Durkin led the defense with 105 tackles, and John O'Rorke added 100 stops.

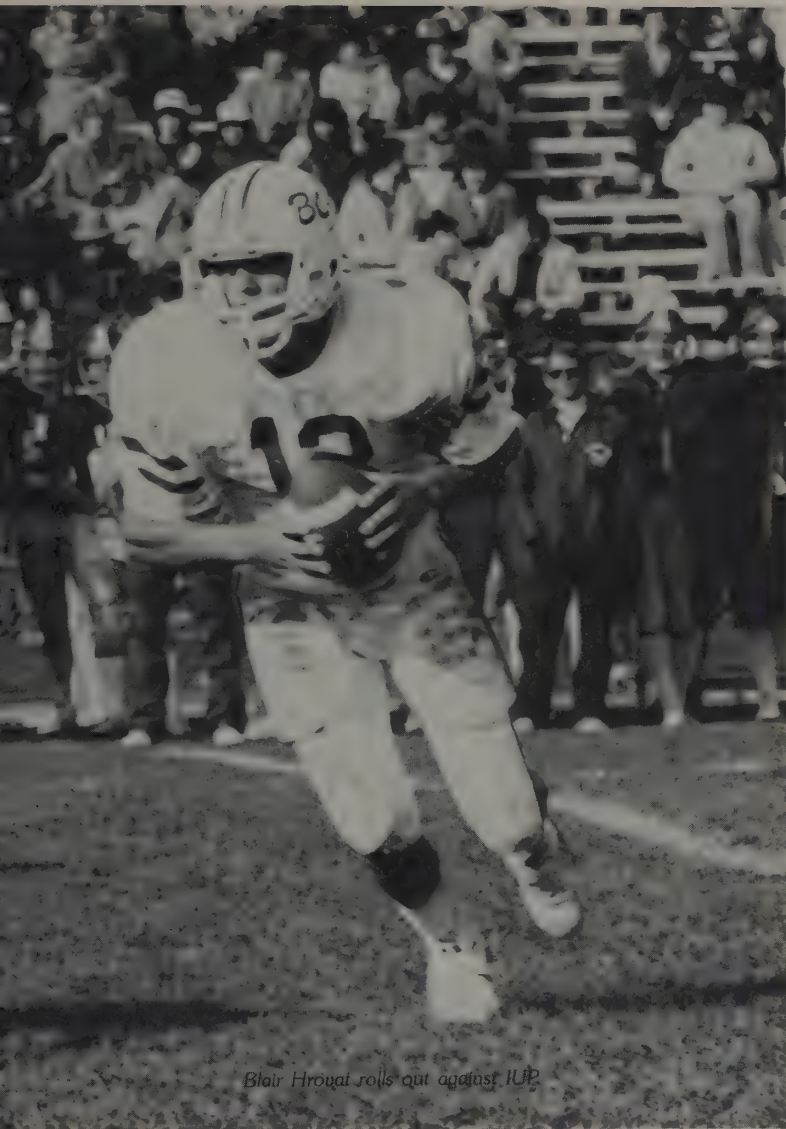

Mitchell Kelly looks for an opening during the Indiana game.

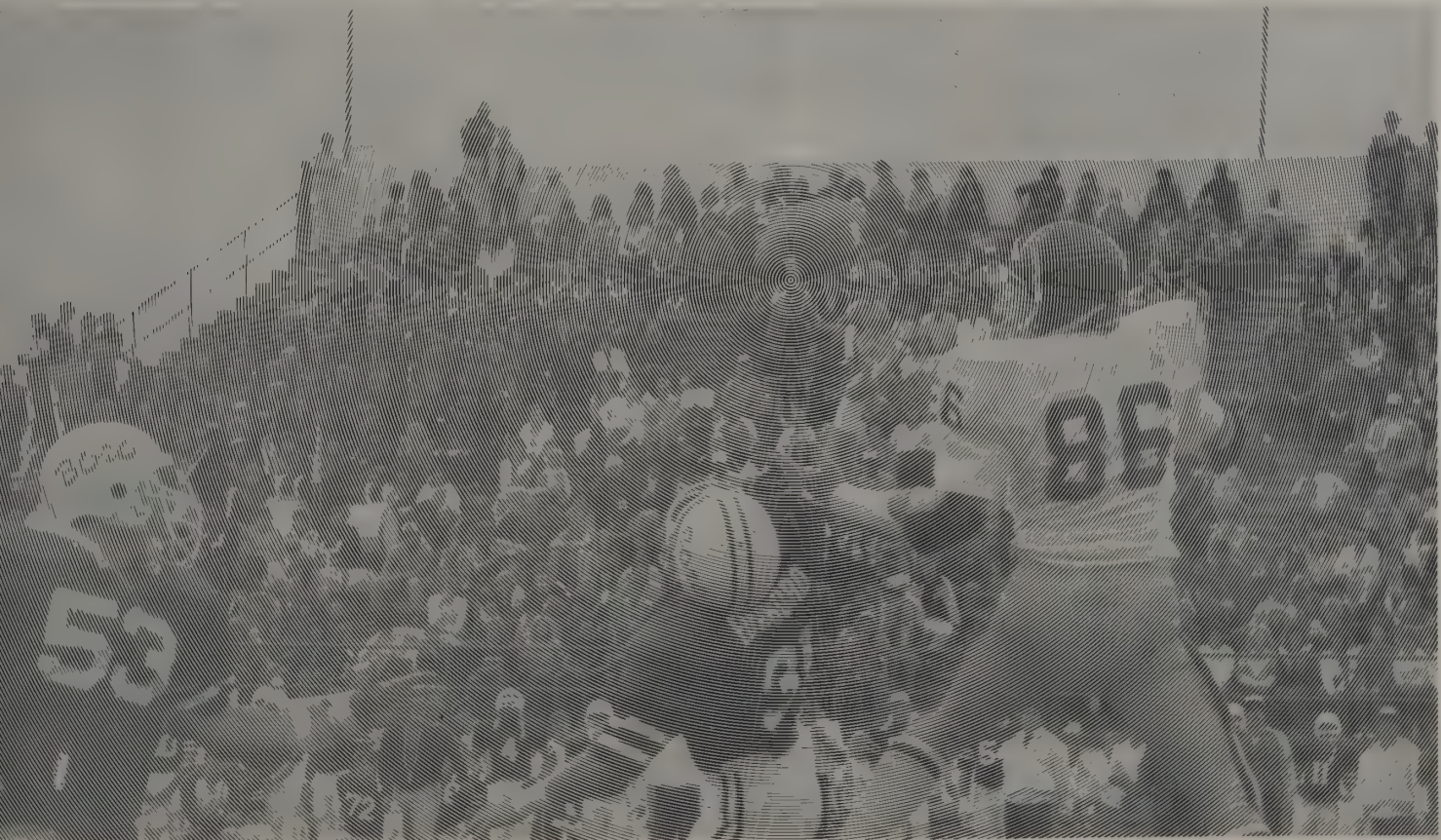

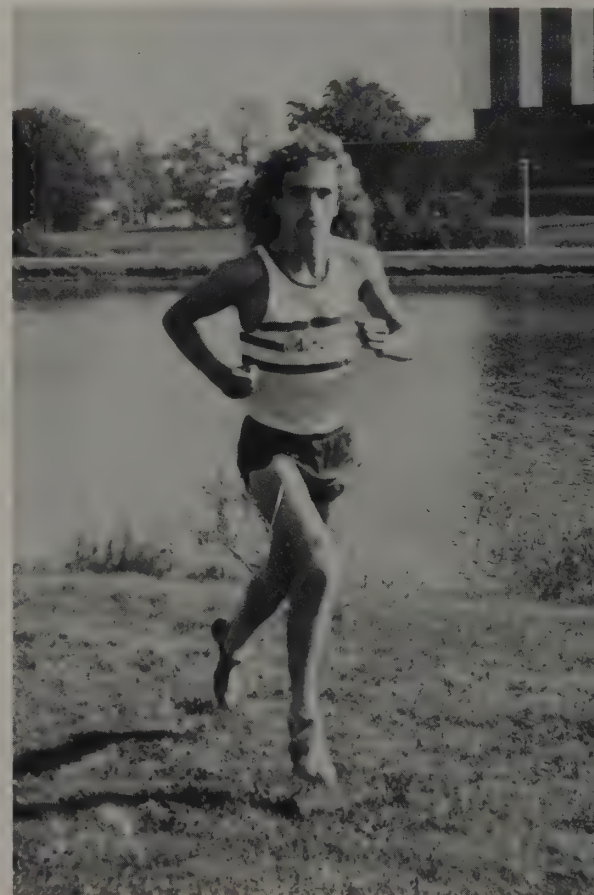

National Champion Greg Beardsley displays his form



Senior Greg Beardsley captured the individual championship to lead Edinboro to a ninth-place finish in the NCAA Division II Championships. Running through ankle-deep snow, Beardsley crossed the finish line one minute ahead of his closest competitor in St. Cloud, Minnesota. Beardsley also claimed the Regional Championship to conclude his successful career at Edinboro.

Coach Doug Watts' team shut out Allegheny, Gannon, and Mercyhurst to prove their dominance in Northwestern Pennsylvania. It also stretched their winning streak to 54 consecutive dual matches. Watts teams have now compiled ten consecutive undefeated seasons.

The main thrust of the runners' season is tournaments, and this year found the scots travelling to four. They were easy victors in the Buffalo Invitational, but ran against tougher competition in the others. They finished third in Akron, and struggled to capture 12th in their effort to defend their 1981 standing in the Notre Dame Tournament. They also travelled north of the border to match last year's second place finish in the Springbank International run, in London, Ontario.

Six freshmen and five sophomores help form a young nucleus to continue the winning ways. The crew will be led by sophomore Steve Repko, who finished 19th in the nationals, enroute to All-American honors.

Coach Watts was pleased with the team's performance in the late season tournaments. He expects the young runners to continue to improve over the next few years and keep the winning tradition intact.

Outstanding Athlete

Mention the name of Greg Beardsley to the average Edinboro student and they'll probably ask you what section of English he teaches. Mention the name to Cross Country Coach Doug Watts and you'll get a different story. "He's one of the finest runners we've ever had, yet he does not possess outstanding talent. What makes Greg successful is an almost mystical quality that he has developed toward competition. When he steps up to the starting line, I know he will give it his best shot."

The two-time All-America selection in cross country and track began his career at Warren (Pa.) High School where he captured two District 10 Cross Country Championships along with a district two mile track championship in three years of competition.

His career at Edinboro began in the fall of 1979 and he quickly established himself as a proven runner. He placed thirty-fifth at the continually strong Pennsylvania Conference Cross Country Championships, and a very respectable 73rd at the National Collegiate Championships held in Riverside, California.

Greg made tremendous strides in his sophomore season as evidenced by his eighth place finish at the Pennsylvania Conference Meet, which enabled the Fighting Scots to capture the team title. He topped off the year by placing twenty-sixth at the NCAA Division II Championships in Kenosha, Wisconsin, missing All-America honors by one place.

By the time his junior year rolled around Beardsley became a name to be reckoned with in cross country circles. He won individual laurels in the Notre Dame and Akron Invationals and set a course record of 25:26.5 for 8000 meters at Fredonia State. In the spring Greg shocked the track world by finishing .3 of a second behind Mike Vanatta of Southeast Missouri State, in the finals of the 3000 meter steeplechase at the NCAA Division II Championships.

Coming into his senior campaign he was chosen captain and has continued to provide leadership and confidence to Coach Watts' relatively young harriers. He has placed in the top ten in every race this year, and established a course record of 29:33 over the 10,000 meter Edinboro Road Course on campus.

Beardsley placed third in the Pennsylvania Conference Meet in October and first in Na-



tional Championships in November at St. Cloud State University, Minnesota.

In January Beardsley captured the West Point Invitational. He plans to use the spring semester to prepare for yet another national title try in May at Southeast Missouri State University.

Football Playoffs: Scots Host Championship

Edinboro State, the Pa. Conference Western Division Champion, hosted East Stroudsburg in the Pennsylvania Conference football championship. The Scots entered the game with a 9-1 record and East Stroudsburg, the East Division champions came in with a 8-2 record.

Rich Ruskiewicz missed field goals from 46 and 43 yards in a scoreless first period.

Joey Pingitore booted a 25 yard field goal for the visitors on their first possession of the second quarter.

The Scots answered with 4½ minute, 82 yard drive, capped by Keith Collier's one yard scoring drive. Ruskiewicz's pass for a two point conversion failed.

After the kickoff, it was 1-2-3 punt for East Stroudsburg and quarterback Blair Hrovat went to work. On second and ten, he connected with Eric Bosley for a 54 yard touchdown pass, and ran in for a two point conversion. The first half ended with Edinboro leading 14-3.

East Stroudsburg took advantage of Edinboro mistakes for 15 second-half points. Kevin Conlan's first punt of the half went only 15 yards and left the Eastern champs only 40 yards away from the end zone. Three Andy Baranek passes put the ball in the end zone and the two-point conversion failed.

The following kickoff was fumbled and East Stroudsburg recovered at the Edinboro 18. On the first play from scrimmage, Baranek found Ernie Siegrist in the end zone, and again the conversion failed, but they regained the lead, 15-14.

Edinboro regained the lead on a 74 yard drive with nine running plays. Hrovat ran for the 2 point conversion.

Joey Pingitore kicked his second field goal with 12 minutes left to cut the Boro lead to 22-18.

The winning touchdown was set up by an interception of a Blair Hrovat pass at the Edinboro 28 yard line. Nine plays later Dell Walker scored from the 2 yard line to give East Stroudsburg the lead, 24-22, with 3:39 left in the game. Pingitore's extra point attempt was blocked.

Edinboro's last chance slid away as Ruskiewicz missed a 32 yard field goal with 10 seconds left in the game. East Stroudsburg clinched the championship as Ruskiewicz's attempt sailed wide to the right.





Outstanding Athlete

Consistency. That's the first word that comes to the mind of any Edinboro State College football fan when you mention the name Rich Ruskiewicz.

Ruskiewicz, a 5-9, 165-pound senior from Fox Chapel High School, started his football career at Edinboro in 1979. He was the punter and backup kicker behind Pat Comer. It wasn't long before Head Coach Denny Creehan gave Rich the placekicking duties. He ended the season with five field goals in ten attempts. He also had six extra points in ten tries, and 44 punts for 1,346 yards, his longest being a 52-yarder.

Rich came to the Edinboro camp as the number one kicker in his sophomore year, and he didn't disappoint Creehan. "Ruskie" booted 11 of 19 field goals to set a new season record. The previous mark was six, set by John Serrao in 1976 and Frank Berzansky in 1972. He also kicked eight of 13 PAT's. His three field goals in both the Shippensburg and California games tied an Edinboro record. Ruskiewicz's 16 field goals in his first two seasons beat Tom Rockwell's mark of ten set from 1968 to 1970.

The 1981 season meant more laurels for the Pittsburgh native. He tied his own record with a 47-yard kick against Bloomsburg (he had kicked a 47-yarder against California in 1979). He broke his record for most field goals in a season when he split the uprights 12 times in 22 attempts, kicking three at Sox Harrison Stadium versus the University of New Haven.

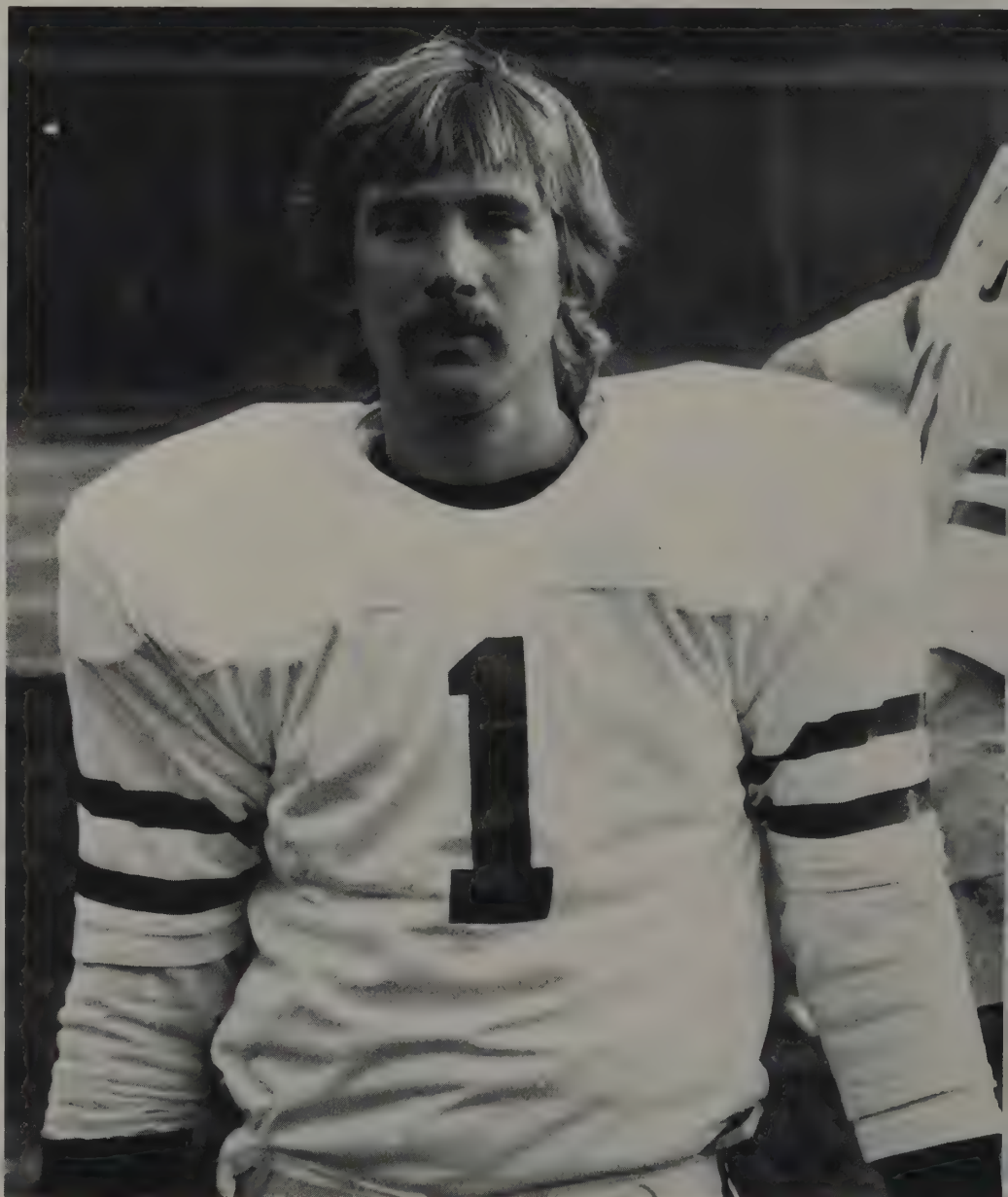
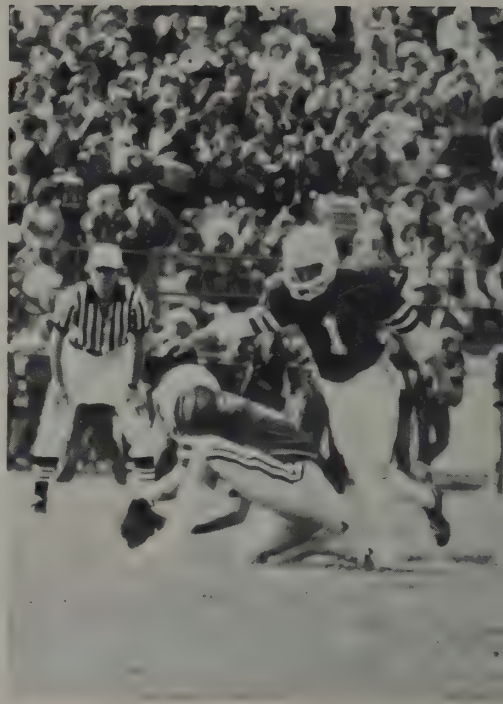
It seems as if Rich breaks any record he wants to. Prior to the Mercyhurst game, he had boomed 14 field goals, breaking his own record in 18 attempts. He also has 20 PAT's in 25 tries. In the Clarion game Rich boomed a 49-yarder to break his previous record. With at least two games to play (Mercyhurst and East Stroudsburg), "Ruskie" had split the uprights 42 times in his four years. Rich said he does have one more record he would like to break. "I would like to hit four field goals. That would be really nice."

Some of the Fighting Scots' success would have to be attributed to "Ruskie's" leg. This is the first time since 1975 that ESC has played for the Pennsylvania Conference championship. "It feels good to play for a champion. I've never been on a championship team before this year." The Scots have been in some very tight games this year, beating Shippensburg 10-6, Slippery Rock 10-7, Indiana 6-3, and losing to Clarion 22-20. Is there much pressure in games like this? "No,

not really. I don't know why, but there isn't that much pressure on me this year."

Rich, in his final year in college, has hopes of playing professional football. "I'd like to play in the Canadian Football League or the National Football League, but I prefer the United States Football League. "Ruskie" should get drafted into either the NFL or USFL. The Cleveland Browns have been looking at him, and so have the Chicago Blitzes of the USFL. Good kickers are hard to come by, as evidenced by the way some teams change every couple of weeks.

Rich is second in Edinboro State history for points scored. He has also led the team in scoring in three of his four years. In 1979 he led the team with 21 points, and in 1980 he finished second behind Tim Beacham with 41 points. Rich paced the team last year with 50 points and had 62 points prior to the Mercyhurst game.



Outstanding Athlete

Kim Wright topped off a brilliant career by capturing the Pennsylvania Conference women's singles tennis title at Millersville State. What makes this accomplishment unique is that it was Kim's second title in as many years. "Kim's accomplishments will never be equaled. Most of the competition she faced had more raw talent to a degree, but her competitiveness and intensity enabled her to defeat 91% of the players she competed against in her career," commented Head Coach George Vierkorn.

Unlike most athletes, Kim did not pick up the game at an early age, "I taught myself the

game at 13, and continued playing regularly from then on," said the history major from Rochester, Pennsylvania. She began her career at Rochester Area High School and swatted her way to an outstanding 47-7 record, including three Section Six titles in four years of competition.

She arrived at Edinboro in the fall of 1979 and quickly picked up where she left off in high school. She started her net career at the number four singles slot, but an inner drive and commitment to success vaulted her to the number one singles position. At the Pennsylvania Conference championships in Shippensburg, she teamed with Judy Reynolds to capture the state doubles title. The format of the tournament did not allow players to compete in both singles and doubles, which kept Kim from participating in the singles event.

In her sophomore season she led the Plaid netters to a 6-3 record and third-place finish at the Conference championships in Bloomsburg. The Conference coaches decided to change the format for the tournament allowing players to compete in both singles and doubles competition. Kim advanced to the semi-finals of the singles before losing to Sissy Baglieri of Slippery Rock, but teamed with Elaine Morford to capture the doubles title for the second year in a row.

Kim's junior year can be described in one word—domination. She blazed to a 13-0 record in singles competition, and lost only one match in doubles after 14 consecutive victories. At the state tournament in Indiana she turned the tables on arch rival Sissy Baglieri of Slipper Rock, 6-2, 6-3, to win the singles title. Her string of doubles titles was broken at two when she and Morford met a strong Slippery Rock duo of Jodi Kest and Sharon Sirpilla in the semi-finals and lost 6-1, 6-1.

Coach Vierkorn elected Kim captain for her final year and she didn't disappoint anyone as evidenced by her 12-1 singles record. Although defending state singles champion, Kim was not seeded in the top four at Millersville. She battled her way through three opponents to reach the finals against Justene Landis of Bloomsburg. In straight sets she won her second consecutive state title, 7-6, 7-6. She ended her career with an amazing singles record of 40-4 and doubles record of 36-6 in four years as a Lady Scot netter.

Looking back at her career, Coach Vierkorn summed it up best, "She is a player who handled herself well on the court. A true competitor, yet she did not believe in a win-at-all-cost attitude. She always made me proud and never complained if things didn't go her way. She is a credit to herself and to Edinboro."



Wrestling

Wrestling coach Fred Caro sent a young team to the mats this year. Only two seniors and five lettermen returned from last year's 2-4 squad on the 24 man roster. Thirteen freshmen made up the rest of this year's squad.

The team's 3-6 record was an indicator of the up-and-down year they experienced. The grapplers opened with a disappointing 21st place finish in the Ohio open tournament, but defeated McMaster and Brock Universities in a quad meet at Buffalo University.

Coach Caro's matmen struggled through the middle of their schedule, learning from perennial power houses Clarion (4-38), Slippery Rock, and Indiana University of Pa. (11-39). The Scots didn't fare much better in mid-season tournaments, finishing 6th out of 7 teams at their own Edinboro Invitational, 12th in the mid-west classic, and 10th out of 13 teams at the West Liberty Tournament.

They wrapped up the regular season with a solid 33-13 victory over Thiel, to prepare for the PSAC meet, which was held at McComb Fieldhouse this year.

The wrestlers finished 9th out of 13 teams, with Ron Hamrick taking fourth place honors to lead the team. Coach Caro is looking for his young wrestlers to improve over the next few seasons.

Women's Volleyball

The Edinboro State women's volleyball team began this season on a note of caution, losing five starters from last year's national championship contender. If Coach Pat McLane did not seem worried it was because he still had seven letter winners returning from last season's 30-13-1 ball club.

Seniors Gerry Burbules and Jolene Nagel, along with juniors Lori Lewis and Janet Bowker, provided the leadership and experience to a relatively young Scot team, that won its third straight Pa. Conference Championship, and made its third trip in a row to post season play.

Sophomore Jodi Raschiatore handled the setter position for the Plaid spikers and is one of the main reasons the Scots compiled a 30-10 record during the fall campaign.

The Highlanders got off to a shaky start, dropping three of their first five matches before getting on track with a victory over Slippery Rock and a first place finish at the Ohio University Tournament.

The Lady Scots then spiked their way to a five match winning streak, before a 15-9, 16-18, 6-15, 11-15, loss to the University of Pittsburgh. After the Pitt loss, the Lady Scots blazed to an amazing 15-3 record

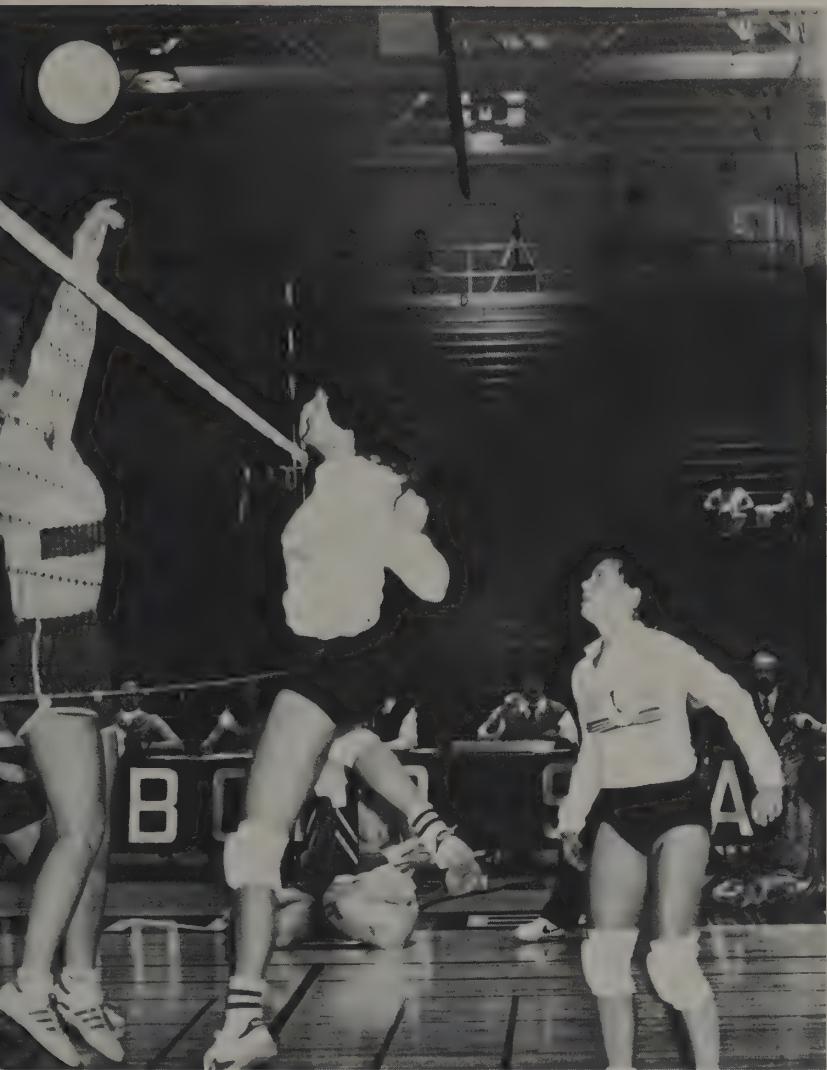
to bring their season mark to 28-8 and a first place ranking in the Atlantic Region.

The Pennsylvania Conference Championships became the most important matches the Scots would play all season. Not only was the conference crown at stake, but the chance to take over the number one ranking in the Atlantic Region and an NCAA bid rode on the results.

The Scots faced a tough test against Shippensburg State in the semifinals, and won 15-11, 12-15, 15-8, 16-14, while Mansfield State scored a mild upset over Indiana University of Pennsylvania. In the finals, Mansfield jumped out of the gates quickly with a 15-9 victory in the first game, but the Scots came back to win the next three, 15-7, 15-10, and 15-2. It was the third straight year that Edinboro captured the Pennsylvania Conference Women's Volleyball Title.

In the NCAA Regional Tournament, at McComb fieldhouse, the women stumbled against North Dakota State in 5 games, and against C.W. Post in 4. Although this was their third straight year in post-season play, it marked their first NCAA appearance. The previous two years, the team took part in AIAW playoffs.

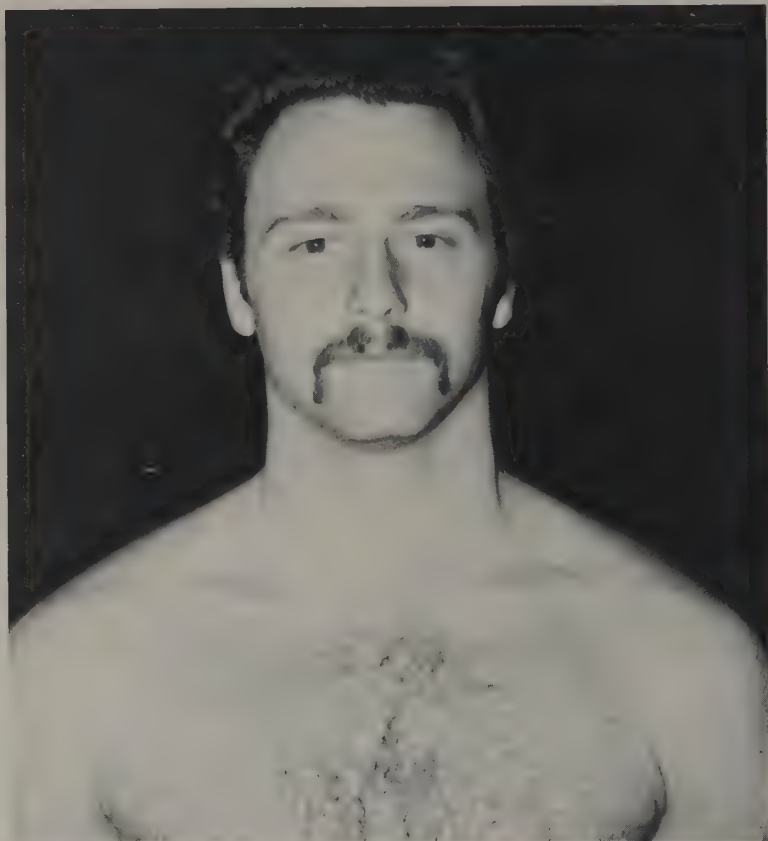

The bowling team was reduced from an intercollegiate team to a club several years ago, but the team spirit has never waned.

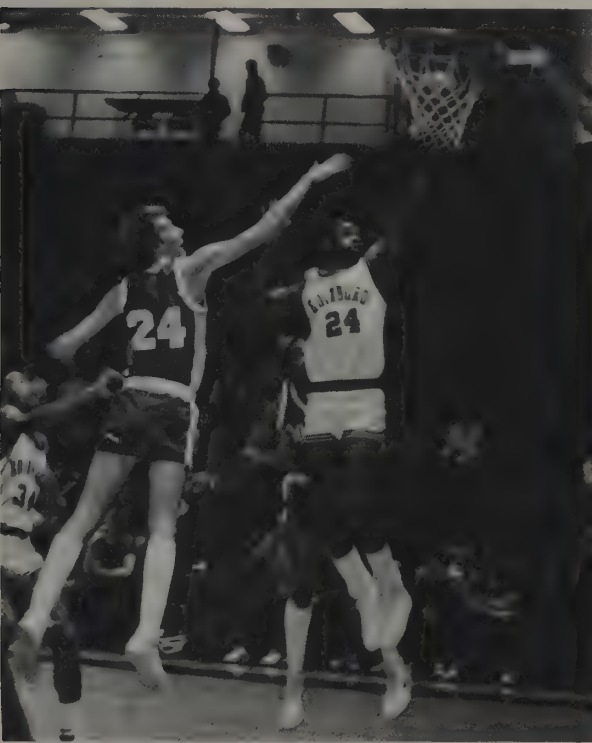

Jack Anderson Speaks At ESC



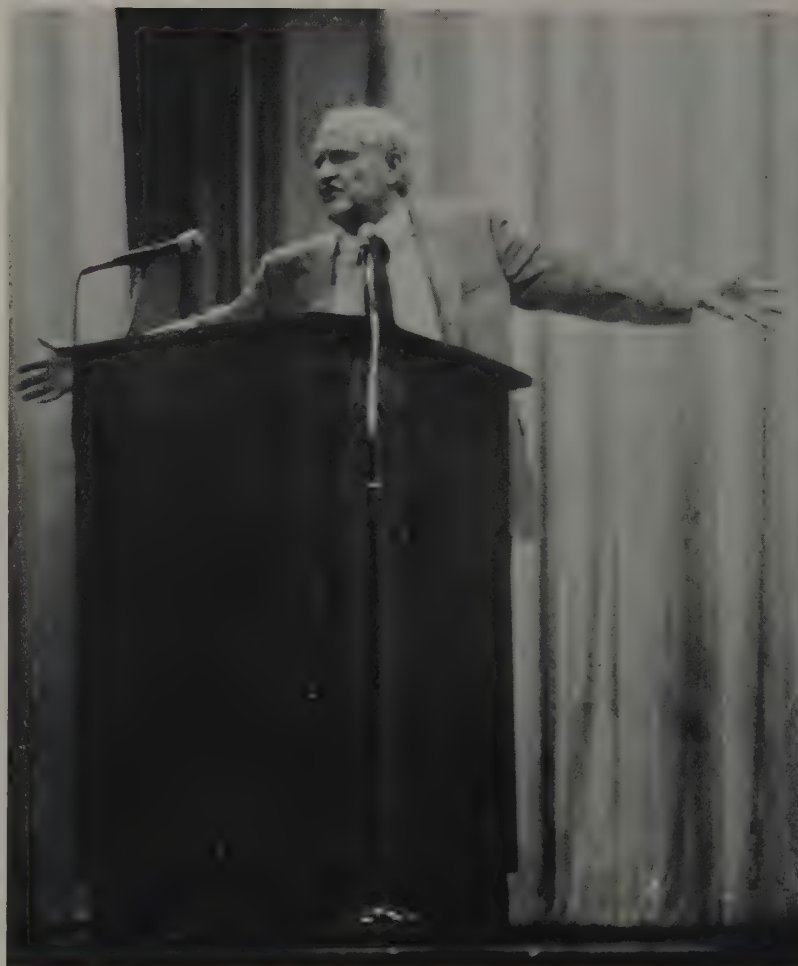
Nationally-known journalist Jack Anderson addressed a sell-out crowd in ESC's Memorial Auditorium on Tuesday, October 5.

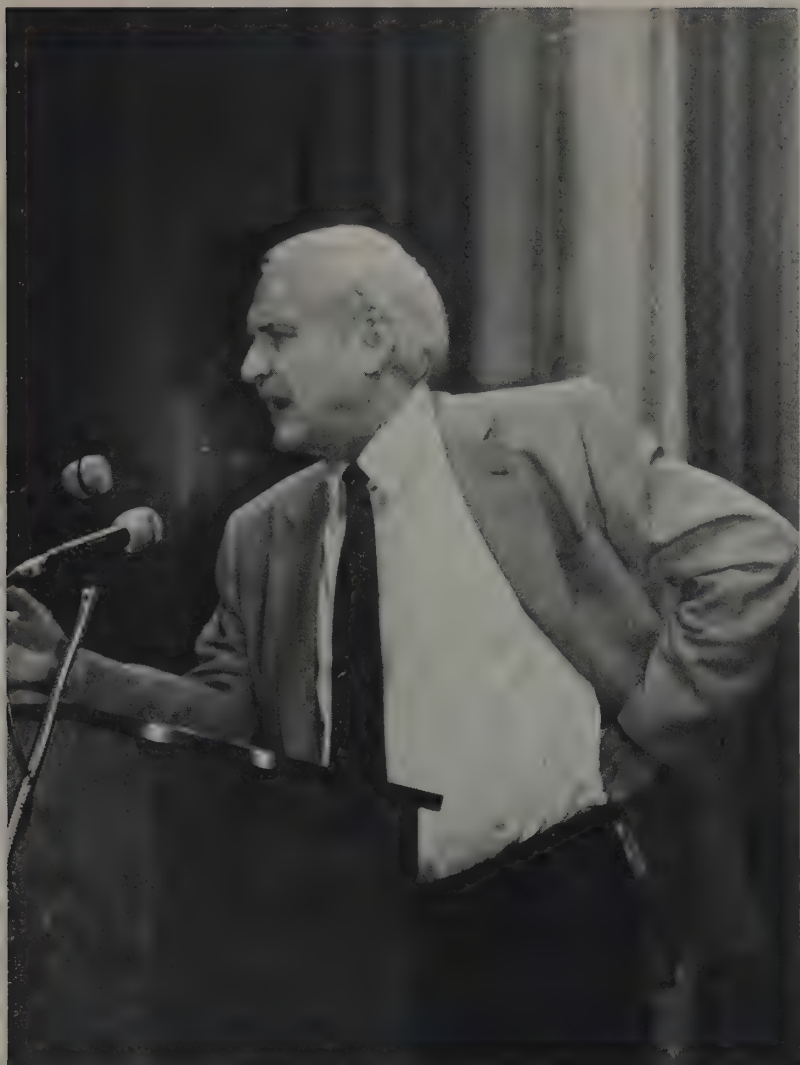
Anderson's appearance marked the beginning of the college's 1982 Cultural Events Series.

Anderson began his talk by saying "government, by its nature, tends to oppress those it has power over." Referring to Thomas using the Jefferson maxim, Anderson explained that we would be better off with no government at all than a government without a watchdog, America's journalist.

Anderson wrote about the oil shortage, the turmoil in Iran, the Argentine invasion of the Falklands and the Israeli invasion of Lebanon before they occurred. He used these events to drive home his thesis on government, the people and the press.

According to Anderson, the politicians also





knew about these events in advance, but they put off action for various political reasons.

"You have to look into the future," Anderson said. "In allowing the Ayatolla to get hold of Iran, Carter caused more bloodshed than there would have been if the U.S. had encouraged the Iranian army to revolt."

According to Anderson, Carter's discouraging the revolt has resulted in a much worse situation today.

Anderson described President Reagan as "a man of great decency and deep conviction. A man who believes what he says and says what he believes."

But Anderson also believes "Reagan's ideas on economics would have been good 100 years ago. He is trying to apply simplistic solutions to complex problems."

Anderson predicts the coming "electronics revolution" will place us in a period much worse than that of the Industrial Revolution. Americans will find the skills they are now learning will become obsolete.

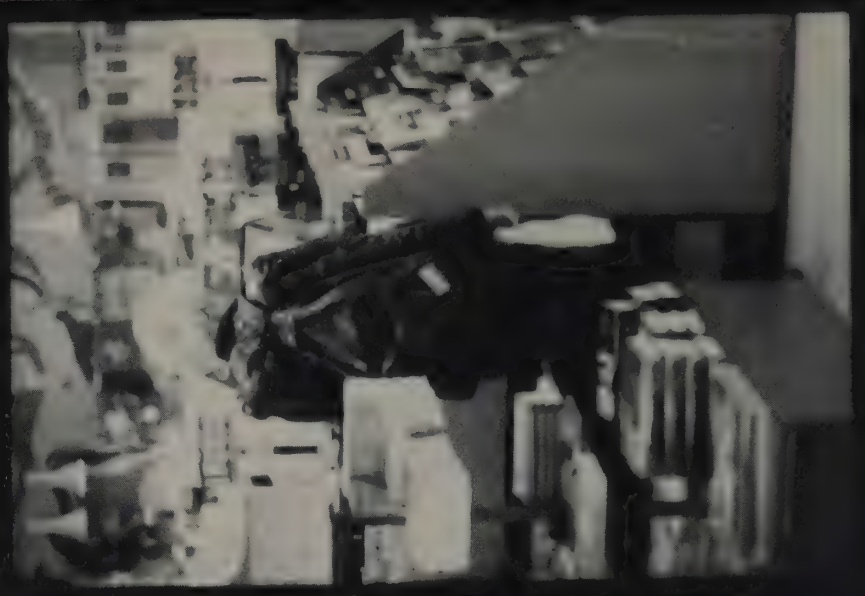
To be ready for the coming revolution, Anderson encouraged the audience "to look ahead, to modify yourselves."

If there is a people on earth who can do it, it's this people—this melting pot." Anderson "hasn't found a better government than ours. No other government offers as much freedom to its people as the United States."







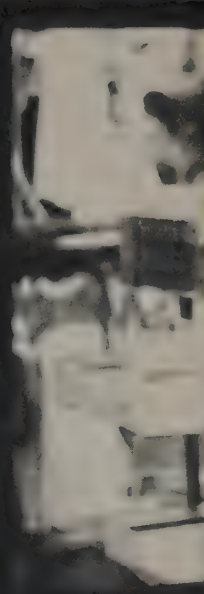

Dr. Gary Christiansen and the management of WFSE have done an outstanding job of developing one of the most versatile, and most listened to college radio stations in the area.

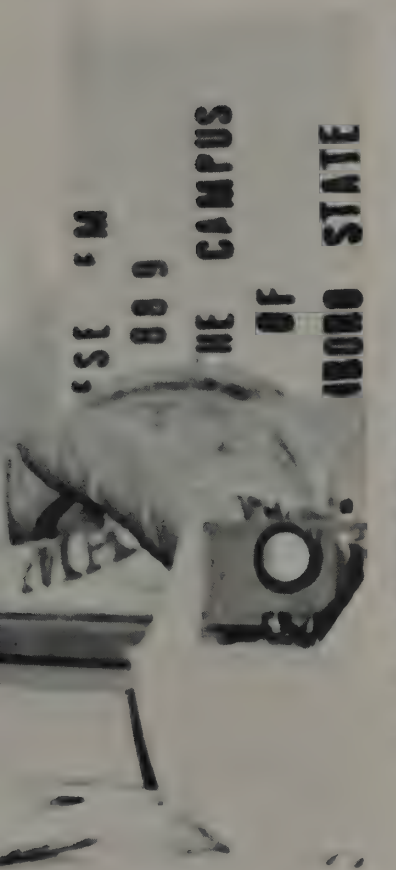

T By a strong Democratic House of Representatives. Some cuts were made, but the greatest impact was the agreement by Congress that the "growth" of the programs should be stymied.

Pell Grants are limited to an \$1800 per year maximum for the next few years. Campus-based aid (Supplemental Grants, National Direct Loans, and College Work-Study) will be frozen at the current appropriation levels for the next fiscal year, likewise.

Guaranteed Bank Loans have been frozen for those whose incomes are over \$30,000 and will continue until 1985 when the House will provide for Congressional revised aid guidelines.

The new financial aid changes for the school year, 1982-83, will be with Pell Grant Validations. Nearly 60 recipients were required to verify their taxable benefits and other specifics on the current year tax return of the recipients and delayed their funding. Other changes have been proposed.

Guaranteed Bank Loans: The new \$30,000 income has reduced loan limits in Pennsylvania. In addition, a five percent origination fee, given to each

Philosophy

Many members of the class of '83 will long remember their philosophy courses in Death and Dying and Sexual Love and Western Morality.

Dr. Roy Stonesifer: A Specialist in America's Past

When students talk about Dr. Roy Stonesifer, the talk inevitably gets to a discussion of the many enjoyable field trips and outings he's sponsored for Edinboro students.

"Stoney" trips are always fun and packed with opportunities to learn.

Each outing involves an excursion into some aspect of United States military history.

Once a year a contingent of ESC students tours the Gettysburg Battlefield, with Dr. Stonesifer and two National Park Service guides who majored in History at Edinboro providing the historical commentary.

In past summers, Roy Stonesifer has led extended tours of both Eastern and Western Civil War battlefields.

Non-students in communities served by ESC have also had an opportunity to share "Stoney's" enthusiasm for Civil War History through the many speaking engagements he fills annually.

History buffs in the Erie area have come into contact with Roy through the volunteer guide's program he sponsors for the Flagship Niagara through the Flagship

Niagara League.

Stonesifer not only manages and trains the guides in various aspects of naval lore, he is involved in the effort to restore this most valuable historical landmark.

A superb classroom teacher, Dr. Roy Stonesifer manages to interest almost all his students not only in basic history but in the special field of military history.

In a department of productive scholars, Dr. Stonesifer's career exemplifies the department's philosophy that sound instruction must be underpinned by active research scholarship.

Stonesifer has reviewed books on military history for the *Journal of American History* and other prestigious journals. In addition, he has served on the editorial board of *Civil War History* and has contributed numerous articles to this and other major journals. Some of his work has appeared in anthologies of major Civil War articles, and Stonesifer served as a senior editor and contributor to a text, *The American Fabric*. At this time, he is putting the finishing touches on a biography of politician-General Gideon Pillow.

In some ways Dr. Stonesifer's approach to instruction is somewhat traditional. However, students learn quickly that behind a sometimes stern exterior, there is a

benevolent Mr. Chips, genuinely concerned with the welfare of each student in his class.

Alert students soon discover that Stonesifer possesses a wry sense of humor which shows through in the humor and insight that pepper his lectures.

Dr. Roy Stonesifer ranks as first among equals in exemplifying the department's reputation for sound and interesting teaching. Perhaps this explains why so many students entering Edinboro are advised by former teachers to take History at ESC and to be sure to meet Dr. Stonesifer.



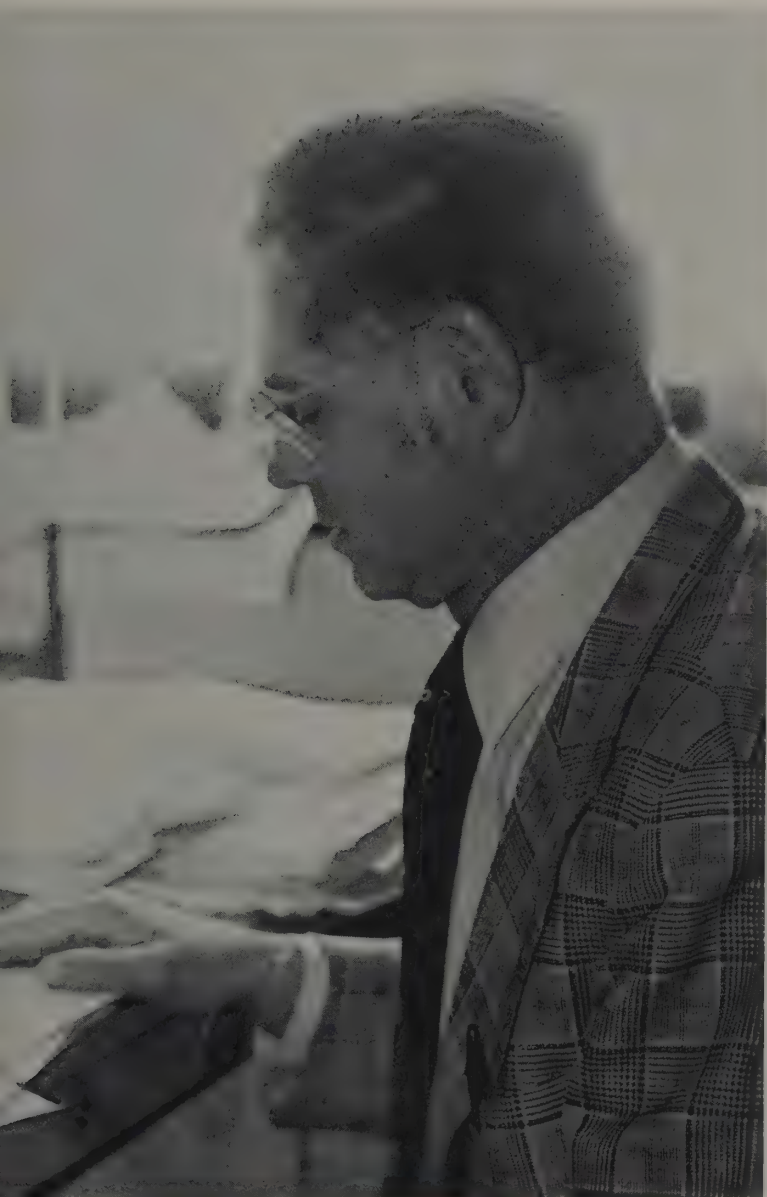

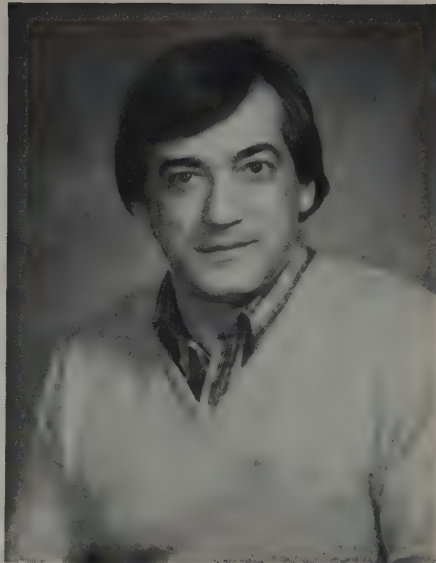
Thinking of a career in business, law, or law enforcement? You might want to take a closer look at EB & PS.

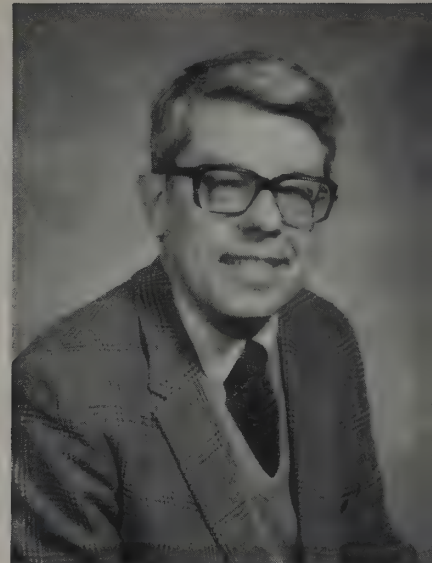

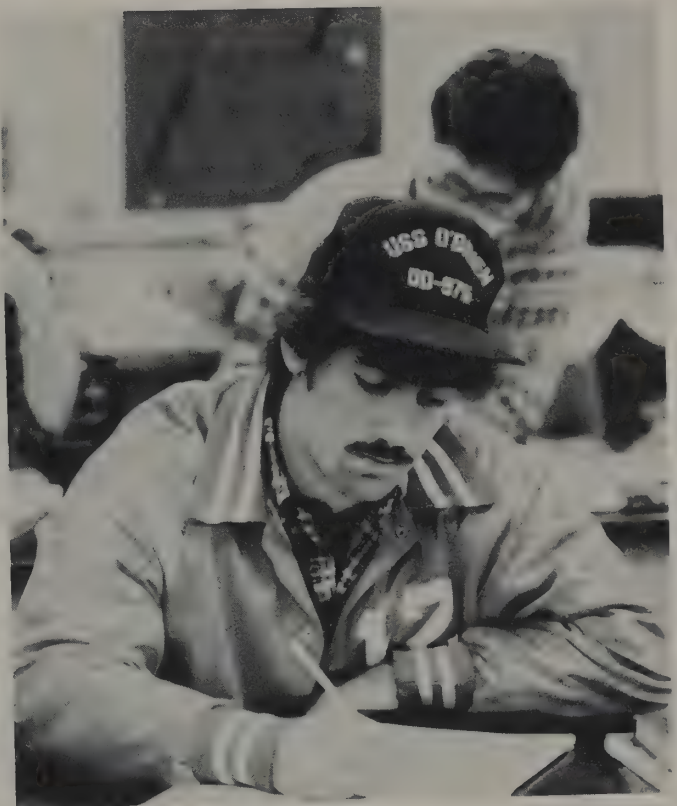

In response to the wonder, the department has queried graduates about what they have done since they left ESC.

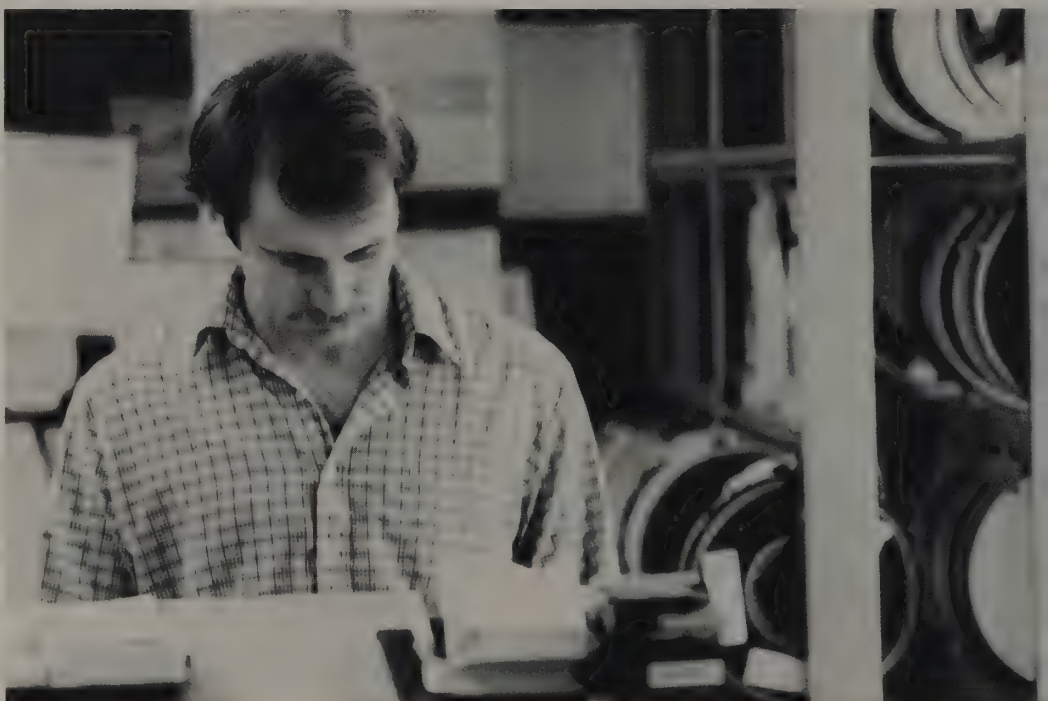
Employment ranges from A to Z. Some are auditors. One manufactures zippers.

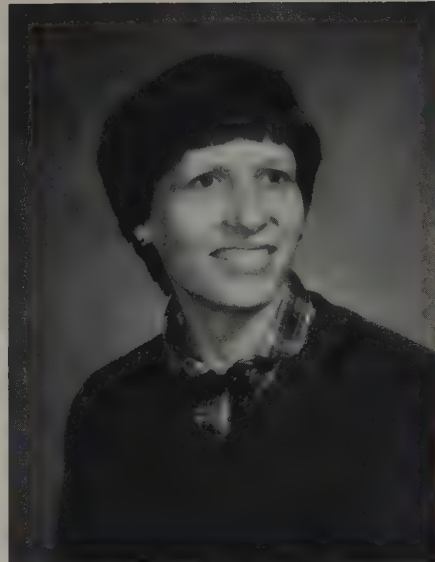
The department also provides opportunities for study and work in athletic training.

CEC is a service-oriented organization. And because of CEC's service involvement, Edinboro's Beta Chapter has hosted both the state and the national regional Special Olympics.

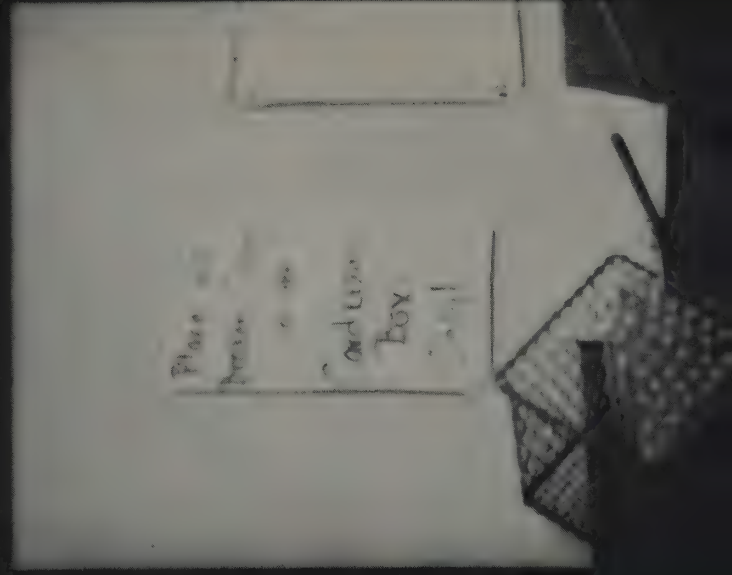
CEC has also planned and implemented other group activities for residents of the various centers for "special" citizens in the ESC service area.

Each year, the outstanding local members of ESC's Beta Chapter is awarded the Mary Rose Ditz Award.

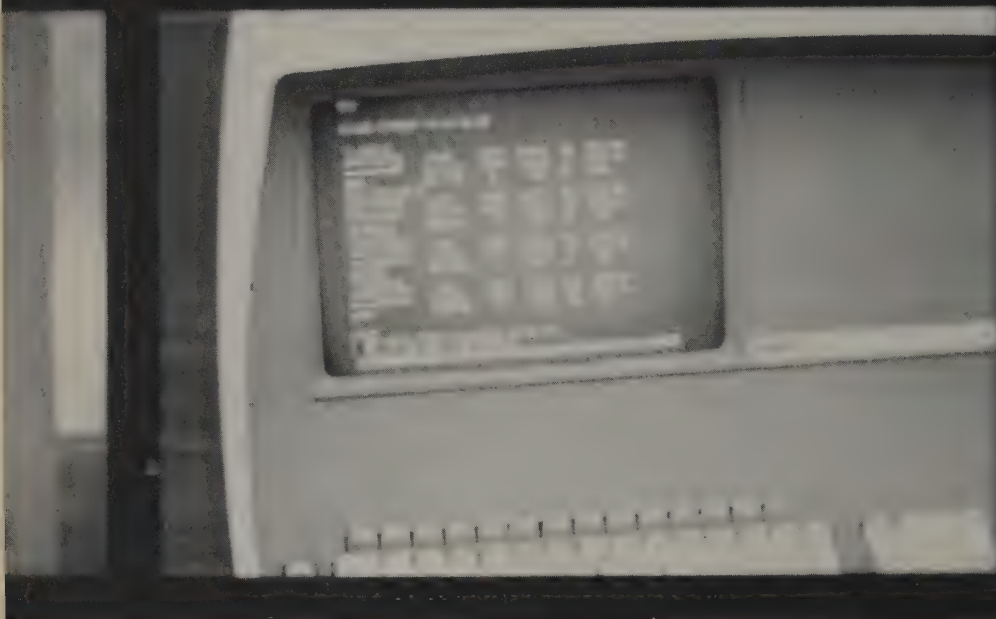
CEC has become the world's leading advocate for better education for exceptional children. It is also the leading contributor to the professional training and involvement of those who serve these exceptional individuals.
