## Brighton athletes

Brighton wrestling is on the move. Every weekday afternoon ... from Twelve Corners Middle School, down Winton Road to Pinnacle Road. Hang a turn into the parking lot at what used to be Rush-Henrietta's Carlton Webster Junior High.
Assume the referee's position and get your gray matter jostled for a couple of hours, then do your homework and go to bed.
Oh, if only life were so simple in Brighton. The district's student-athletes suffer through numerous inconveniences on school days this year while the district's high school is renovated.
That, however, hasn't foiled the Barons. Mark Hoyt's team went 13-1 in dual meets last season and won the Section 5 Class A tournament. Three terrific seniors graduated, but there's enough left to make the Barons favorites to finish the season atop the Democrat and Chronicle's Section 5 coaches poll.

But not without clearing the biggest hurdle of all: the daily routine
"Shirley Bowen's been terrific about coordinating the coaches' schedules wher ever she can," Hoyt said of the Brighton athletic director, "but it gets really confusing at times ... buses are shuttling
back and forth for us and the basketball team, and we're shuffling kids and coaches this way and that way. Actually, it's a lot of fun."

Matt Barry, a 167 -pound senior on the team, listed what he goes through each day, and it's not for the laid-back crowd:

- Up at 6:15 a.m., in classes (including math, English, physics and computers) an hour later.
- Classes end at about 1:15 p.m. (freshmen and sophomores are in school from about $10 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. to 4 p.m.), so Barry goes home for a couple hours, then returns to Twelve Corners, which currently serves as the high school, by 4 o'clock to be bused to Carlton Webster.
- After a three-hour practice, everyone rides back to Brighton. Barry returns home, has dinner and is in bed by about 9:15.
II don't see much TV anymore, but that doesn't bother me," Barry said. "What $I$ miss is the sports shows like Monday Night Football. I can see the kickoff and that's about it."
"The adjustment wasn't as tough as 1 thought it would be," Barry said. "You have to learn to utilize your free time wisely. I know I have to do homework before I go to practice.
"I guess things are working out better than I figured they would."

"It's not going to be as easy for us as people think," Hoyt said, but he also admits to having "five seniors who've been around the horn a few times. They're people to build around." Back are 1986 sectional Class A champ Mitch Stern (now at 98) and 20. plus winners Dan Presberg (112) and Todd Knowles (119). Sophomore Kerry Foster is up a class to 105 after going 30-7-1 and winning a sectional title. Two other high placers at sectionals, Tom Cunningham and Nick Castiglia, graduated, but two tough sophs (Todd LeGrette at 112 and Jon Welch at 167) take their spots.
Seniors Dave DelForte (119) and Joe Boganno (145) join junior Craig Buck as returning veterans. 6 Hilton: "Most teams, if they lost five kids who would have been seniors, would feel their season had been wiped out," Hilton Coach Al Krotz said. "I'm fortunate to have people to fill the openings."

Throw in the graduation of 112 pound state champ Dave Pitoni to the problems, but balance that with the return of sophomore Antonucci (98) and junior Rick Sadwick (167), sectional finalists last year. Senior Todd Page returns 20 wins to the 177-pound division, and county JV champions Jason DePrez and Don Potter move up. 7 Waterloo: Forget about "One little, two little, three little Indians
Seventh-year Coach Abe Meyers has 14 varsity veterans, and three (Bill Brown in '84, Tom Finnerty in '85 and Shawn Knisely in '86) are former 91-pound sectional Class B champs.

Bill Norberg was a sectional finalist during a $25-5$ junior season. Another to watch is Tim Spina, who'll be at 167 following a $27-7-1$ sophomore season.

Victor: This is a
not-so-hurting young team, with enough people back from an 8-6-1 team that came within a point apiece against Canandaigua and Pal -Mac.
Senior Gary Gilbert, sectional finalist at 145 last season, is back to improve upon a 21-9-1 record. Two juniors, Jeff Knapp (132) and Steve Amyot (138), round out a solid middle-of-the-lineup arrangement for Coach Jeff Kaller.

$9^{1}$McQuaid: The five-time defending City-Catholic champions have their best chance in ages to inflict some serious damage of other Class A schools. Coach John Roselli (213-62-4 in 21 seasons) has his entire lineup back, including two top-four performers in the 1985 tournament (Paul Roselli and Ed Porto) and two from '86 (Rob Wilson and Shannon Costello).

The dual tests come in February: non-leaguers with Pal-Mac, Canandaigua and Waterloo.

10Le Roy: The return of 215 -pounder Bill Hixenbaugh after a year in Michigan is a help to Coach Bob Gately's squad. Also back are Bill

Dempsey (126), the B champ at 119 last year, and Mike Chester (177), the runner-up at 167 as a sophomore.
Senior 132 -pounder Todd Capwell also is back from a team that went $10-4$ and then finished a distant second to East Rochester in sectionals.

## Around the area

City-Catholic League: First-year Cardinal Mooney Coach John Walker inherits three senior leaders: John Bell (145), Mike Briggs (138) and John LeDoux (132). At Edison, Frank Mielnicki is trying to plug gaps in the middle, but has Bill Cronmiller (177), Allan and Andrew Aceto (91 and 98, respectively) and Tony Caldcronie (112) back at the extremes.

Monroe County West: Class B heavyweight champ Joe Amico returns for Batavia. Another senior to watch is 126-pounder Mark Robinson, who was 25-7 last season. Greece Athena Coach Frank Vito has back 126 -pound senior Ilias Diakomihalis, a 30 -win wrestler and sectional semifinalist.
Gates-Chili Coach Jim Hosenfeld used a lot of young wrestlers during a $4-9$ season, so freshman Shawn Bauer (98) and sophomore Jim Giglio (105) should be prepared to contribute. Senior Tom Reina will wrestle at 138. Greece Olympia will be OK after the lower weight classes as Bill Baird (167) and senior Pete Bray (138) return. And let's not forget Chuchville-Chili. Any team that holds a midnight practice has to have determination, and 215 -pounder Mike Michelson should be watched.
Monroe County East: Webster should be an early candidate as a top

10 replacement behind 138 -pound " A " runner-up Chris Yengo. Irondequoit senior Shawn Cavanaugh (now at 215) came within a victory of going to states at 177 last season. He's joined by Bill Barker (177) and fifth-year vet Tom Izzo (138). Juniors Todd Burchard (145), Jason Hulett (138) and Jim Quattrociocchi (132) make RushHenrietta rough through the middle.
Fifteen seniors make this the most experienced Pittsford team in memory. Dave Nicoll (112) and Chris Miller (145) were second-team all league last season. Twenty-second year Fairport Coach Pete Logan will season his youngsters with non-leaguers against Hilton, Brockport, McQuaid and Pal Mac. Seniors Dan Macca (132) and Marc Rosone (145) are the leading veterans.
Senior Fritz Zagorski is coming off a 30-3 season and leads John Yengo's Eastridge team. No one on the Penfield roster jumps out at you, but the Chiefs are solid up and down the line. Dave Brooks (126), Mike Maina (145) and Rich Jones (167) are the leading seniors.
Finger Lakes East: Palmyra-Macedon's program remains in an up cycle, with 52 participants in grades $9-12$ after a $14-1$ season. Coach Fred Ciaburri's varsity team features sectional " B " finalist Darwin Michielsen at 112 , and senior Tim McDonald at 215. Bob Elmer (167) and Don Craig (119) are other leading seniors.
