

Edison-Tech Wrestlers Take Four Crowns in Interscholastic Tournament

OCCIDENTAL MATMEN WIN THREE BOUTS

East and Monroe Cop One Title—Heavies In Feature Match

Edison-Tech High School's wrestlers added individual honors to their team championship in the Interscholastic League by winning four of the nine city school titles in the finals of the three-day tournament yesterday afternoon at Monroe High, West High, which gave the Inventors a hard battle for the loop crown, ran a close second yesterday with three championships; East and Monroe High accounted for the remaining two.

Coch Hobart Hoff's squad gained its majority in the final bout—the heavyweight contest, which proved to be the most exciting tilt of the day. Raymond Schroeder, 220-pound inventor, scored a fall over Bill Maier, 180-pound Westside, in 2 minutes, 28 seconds, of his period to cop. Maier threw Schroeder in 3 minutes, 55 seconds of the initial session, but the Edison-Tech lad triumphed as he gained his fall in quicker time.

Frank Jenner of West, confined to his bed by doctor's orders Monday, came back to defeat Joe Frederico of Edison-Tech for the 160-pound crown after a bitter extra-trip struggle. Both boys got up in the regular special periods, but Jenner broke away from his opponent earlier to get a time advantage of 1 minute, 48 seconds.

Results Reversed
John DeFrancisco of Monroe and Gene DePrez of West defended their titles successfully yesterday. DeFrancisco threw Mike Abruzzi of West twice to keep his 126-pound championship. DePrez, heavyweight titleholder last year, went down to the 175-pound class this season and beat Edward Wilson, a strong but inexperienced youngster.

Results were reversed in all three bouts showing West and Edison-Tech lads who had met Monday in their league fray and were re-matched in the tourney finals. Michael Caputo, Occidental, gained revenge over George Rice after two extra periods by a time edge of 1 minute, 18 seconds, in the 118-pound division. George LaMarco of Tech beat out Victor Caccamise in the 112-pound class, and Mike Bulavinetz, Inventor, scored over James Cavoti for the 147-pound crown.

Angelo Vollo was East's winner, fending off the attack of Al Brunetti, sensational newcomer of the Westsides, in the 135-pound group. Vollo hung up a time advantage of 2 minutes, 33 seconds. Wood Shatters Par to Take Lead in North-South Event

Pinehurst, N. C., Mar. 24.—(AP)—Craig Wood, from Deal, N. J., coupled two par-plundering rounds of 69 today to gain the halfway leadership in the 72 hole north and south golf tourney as the competing professionals showed their scorn of the course's perfect figures by a barrage of sub-par scores.

Wood's 138 total gave him a two stroke advantage over Paul Runyan, from White Plains, whose fine 67 topped the first round cards.

Wood's morning card showed five birdies and an eagle, while he shot the same number of birdies in the afternoon. Two blows behind Runyan, after the morning round he matched his earlier performance while Runyan slumped to 73, largely as the result of being trapped on the 18th.

Hagen Ties for Third
Walter Hagen, Detroit, and Joe Kirkwood, New York, tied for third place with 142 each, both having 70-72's while four players were bracketed at 143: Harry Cooper, Chicago; Johnny Farrell, New York; Johnny Golden, Noroton, Conn., and John Kinder, Irvington, N. J.

Gene Sarazen, New York, whose 69 gave him a second place tie for the morning round, soared to 73 this afternoon for a total of 144, while Tommy Armour, Detroit, carded 145, the result of a great 69 in the afternoon after a high 76 in the opening round.

Wifty Cox, last year's winner, was another morning leader who faltered. Cox had 71-76-147, and Ed Dudley, Wilmington, Del., put 77 with a morning 72 for a 149, where he was tied with the National Open champion, Billie Burke, Providence, R. I. Burke started with a 77, but tightened in the afternoon to turn in a 72. Tommy Kerrigan had 146.
