

# Thinking Pays For Palmer

## Explains Victory In Baton Rouge Open

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) — "I've been thinking a little as I played."

That's Arnold Palmer's explanation for his sensational play on the Professional Golf Assn's winter tour.

The Ligonier, Pa., professional Sunday won the \$15,000-Baton Rouge Open for his second straight tournament victory and third since the start of the tour. The \$2,000 top money boosted his earnings since January to \$22,211.86, an unprecedented amount this early in the season.

Palmer took the lead in the second round with his second straight one under par 71. He never gave any other player a chance to catch him. He shot a 69 Saturday and a 68 yesterday.

He wound up with a 279. His nearest pursuers were seven strokes back. They were Jay Hebert, Lafayette, La., Ronnie Reif, Singing Hills, Calif., and Doug Sanders, Miami, Fla., all tied for second at 286.

Five players tied for fifth with 290. They were Bob Goalby, Crystal River, Fla., Lionel Hebert, Lafayette, La., Don Fairfield, Jacksonville, Ill., Jack McGowan, Clearwater, Fla., and Doug Ford Crystal River, Fla.

Palmer said the difference Sunday was hit putting. The secret of his successes here, however, was his ability to make good shots when the ball was imbedded in the ground, he said.

"There were about eight of them. On at least six," he said, "the ball was buried."

# 'Lady Luck' Continues To Frown On Trojan Wrestling Star; Gowanda, Cassadaga Valley Repeat As Sectional Champs

If Lady Luck ever decides to smile instead of frown on Gary Capron, Southwestern Central School's 183 pounder, he may become a divisional wrestling champ.

Capron won and lost two of the fastest matches in Section VI Class A competition at Southwestern over the weekend.

The fluid-moving junior defaulted to Don Williams of Eden in the finals Saturday night when a dislocated elbow sent him to the sidelines after 48 seconds. Capron had entered the finals with a 43-second pin of Art Snow of Salamanca.

It was the second such mishap to Capron in sectional competition. Last year the elbow went awry against Dave Nichols of Cassadaga Valley in the 168-pound final.

A field of 232 boys came to grips in 116 matches during the two-day event, well-attended both Friday and Saturday nights despite unfavorable driving conditions, a strong indication the mat sport is continuing to catch on at Southern Tier schools.

Also evident is that a Class A and B championship duel is in progress between Gowanda and Cassadaga Valley although they may never meet to settle it head-to-head. Coach Joe Anarella's Cass Valley Cougars won their Third Class B crown and Gowanda, ably coached by Ernie Bareham, copped its fourth Class A title.

Sectional competition, too, appears to be getting tighter and tighter as some of the more recent entries to mat competition improve. There were four pins in final competition Saturday night compared to eight on the last day a year ago and 13 the previous year.

Unbeaten Vince Scholeno of Falconer finished the season that way, winning the Class A 98-pound title with a shutout 4-0 decision over Lyle Boss of Gowanda.

Three champs repeated. Doug Evans of Gowanda, who pinned Scholeno in the 98-pound final a year ago, decided Chuck Millman of Randolph to win the 115 "B" crown and Gall Dallas of Falconer, 123 champs in 1959, finished the same way in the 130 this time out, decisioning John Ross of Gowanda in "A."

Bruce Haggart, Gowanda's 106 champ in '59, took the 115 title, winning the call over lanky Wayne Vollettine of Falconer.

Undeclared Ludwig Sternard of Gowanda also closed out a perfect season when he decisioned Bob Larson of Southwestern, 1-0, in the heavyweight final.

John Stanz of Randolph capitalized on a takedown to win a double overtime grind from Doug Fancher of Pine Valley, 3-1, for the Class B 136 crown.

Shannon Vanderwark of Falconer and John Miller of Southwestern also went overtime, the former winning the Class A 141 on a pin in 52 seconds of the extra period.

This one was a real thriller all the way between two boys who had split 1-0 decisions during regular season competition.

Two other smaller men put on a classy clash when Paul Grafstrom of Cassadaga Valley won a 1-0 decision over David Openbeck of Cattaraugus with an escape in the last six seconds.

The heavyweight Class B was

one of the few pins, Jim Hill of Cattaraugus turning Marty Westley into an arm-lock combination that led to a 5:55 fall.

Sternard, who had decisioned Larson in Class A heavy grappling twice this season, was hard pressed all the way by the big Southwestern wrestler. Sternard picked up the winning margin on an escape in the second period, gained the advantage position and rode out most of the last period.
